

1. The Junior Livestock Show is open to any 4-H/FFA members between the ages of 8-21, as of January 1, 2009. Non-competitive youth classes are available for 5-7 years olds in certain species.
2. Exhibits will be placed from first through last placed and will be judged on the Danish system for ribbon awards.
3. Open shows (out-of-county exhibitors welcome) will be held for all species.
4. Premiums for Junior Livestock Youth Show will be mailed within sixty (60) days of the end of the show.
5. Animals can only be shown in one class (with exception of the Bred and Owned & Group classes). Example: A gilt may be shown as a market gilt or as breeding gilt (not both).
6. Stall fees per head are as follows: (Due July 10, 2009)

- Unpaid fees will be deducted from premium checks.
7. Every exhibitor, in consideration of their entry being accepted, specifically represent that no animal entered by the exhibitor is fitted by altering the natural conformation, normal dental development, structure of the animal or altering the color or structure of the hair or wool coat in any way except for trimming or blocking.

All exhibitors agree to submit their entries for any inspection deemed appropriate by the veterinarian, official, or committee. In the event that any such animal is declared to be artificially altered, in conformation and/or structure, the Committee and Fair Officials may permanently bar the animal and the exhibitor from further competition in the Cass County Junior Livestock Show. This would require the immediate return, to CCJLA, all premiums, monies, trophies, and ribbons awarded to the disqualified animal(s).

Specifically: Any animal showing evidence of sharp practices (such as surgical removal of excess brisket or dewlap skin, filling with oil or foreign material, etc.) will be barred from the show as will the exhibitor of such animals.

Painting, dyeing, and use of color agents on animals is not condoned by CCJLA Livestock Show officials. Animals, which show evidence of altering, will not be permitted into the show ring. If a color or coloring agent rubs off an animal when rubbed with either a towel or hand, that animal will be disqualified.

After a class has been placed in the show ring, show officials reserve the right to re-inspect animals for color or sharp practices. If such is found, the animal will be barred from further competition and forfeit all premium money.

All animals will be subject to urine, blood and/or tissue analysis for diuretics and anabolic compounds and feed additives or drug residues at the discretions of the show management or state federal inspector. Positive test will result in forfeiture of premiums and sale monies.

Animals are to be groomed/clipped by the 4-H/FFA exhibitor, with assistance from the immediate family, a exhibiting 4-H/FFA member, or a registered project leader.

8. Should any physical abuse be observed toward an animal, either in the barns or in the show ring, by the exhibitor or his agents; the superintendents has the authority to excuse the exhibitor and animal from the show.
9. Uncontrollable animals, which the exhibitor cannot handle alone, may be disqualified by Show Superintendents or Board Members, and be required to leave the show ring. This would eliminate the animal of its eligibility for participation in the auction.
10. The CCJLA Livestock Show and Youth Fair will follow the rules and regulations of the Missouri State Fair, unless otherwise specified.
11. 2009 Livestock Show Review Board will consist of: Ray Rushly, CCJLA President; Jason Dieckhoff, CCJLA Vice-President; Matt McIntire, FFA Representative, Tammy Bartholomew, 4-H Representative; and David Hoffman, Livestock Specialist. Show concerns should be addressed to this group. The Livestock Show Review Board's decisions are final.
