Premium Pay-out

Exhibit Pick-up

All exhibits must remain in the building until 4:00 p.m., Sunday, July 12. Premiums will be forfeited for any exhibit removed early. Exhibit pick-up times are:

Sunday, July 12 Items that can be carried out by one person may be removed between 4-6 p.m. All items must be checked out. You will have to pay to get on the fairgrounds to pick your exhibits up on Sunday.

Monday, July 13 Exhibits can be picked up between 11:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m., or from 4:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. All exhibits must be checked out by Dave or Jenny, or premiums will be forfeited.

GENERAL RULES FOR EXHIBITORS

1. 4-H Building Entries will be accepted from 12:30 - 6:00 p.m., Wednesday, July 8. See the schedule in the June 4-H Newsletter for more details.
2. FFA Farm Mechanics exhibits accepted from 8:00 a.m. to noon on Thursday, July 9.
3. Each exhibit shall be owned or made by the exhibitor and shall represent work accomplished in a 4-H or FFA project being carried in the 2008-2009 project year.
4. All judging will be done on the basis of the Danish system which includes blue, red and white groups.
5. Prize money will be awarded to exhibitors. Blue, red and white ribbon winners will receive the points indicated in the premium list. Premium value will be determined by the Franklin County Youth Fair Board.
6. In all classes the decisions of the judge will be final.

ALL BUILDING EXHIBITS MUST REMAIN UNTIL 4:00 P.M. SUNDAY, JULY 12

Items that can be carried by one person can be removed from 4:00 p.m. - 6:00 p.m., on Sunday.
 Larger items must be removed Monday, 11:00 a.m. -1:00 p.m., or 4:00 p.m.-6:00 p.m. No exceptions!

7. **FOR 4-H BUILDING EXHIBITS:** Each exhibitor will be limited to a maximum of 10 items per project. You may enter more than two per class, as long as they are not duplicates. Color change does not qualify exhibit as being different. Construction of the item must be done to induce a change. Notebooks, posters and file card systems will be accepted. Educational displays must include three-dimensional items. Conference Judging is limited to four exhibits, **but only one exhibit per project.**
8. **All exhibits must be pre-registered.** All advanced registrations must be in the University of Missouri Extension Office no later than 4:30 p.m. Friday, June 19.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS FOR BUILDING EXHIBITS

Where the exhibit list states, "any item made," members may display any item made in that project. This includes notebooks, file cards, photo displays, posters, or educational displays. Regardless of project, the following dimensions must be used:

- **Poster** - No larger than **14" x 22"**; flat only; **do not fasten three-dimensional items to the poster.**
- **Any Photo display** - Photos must be mounted on 11" x 14" backing board not to exceed 1/8" in thickness (white or off-white only). Photo matboard is recommended. **Do not use poster board or foamcore board.** Photos can be mounted horizontally or vertically. There should be no writing on the backing board. Photos must be permanently fastened to the backing board with photographic adhesive (no corner mounts). No use of glass and/or wooden, metal, or plastic frames is allowed. Photos can be matted with a single window mat if appropriate. No use of double mats is permitted. Margins are at the discretion of the exhibitor. Full 11" x 14" photos may be mounted flush on the backing board. Exhibitors are encouraged to place mounted photos in a two-gallon size ziplock bag to protect the exhibit. Photo stories should consist of no more than four photos. **These requirements must be followed for a photo exhibit in any project.**
- **Educational display** - Must not exceed 11 inches in height, 12 inches in depth (front to back) and 14 inches in width. Must include three-dimensional items and stand alone. (Posters with items taped to them do not qualify as an educational display. Science fair display boards are too large.)
- **Entomology or Geology display boxes** - Box must be 18" long x 24" wide and 3½" deep. Plexiglas or plastic covers are preferred. No handles or knobs.
- **Working models** – These exhibits should show how things work (cut away sections of motors or computers for example) or can be used to help identify parts such as parts of a motor or computer. Items such as model wildlife plots, cut-away engines, or other similar displays should require floor space no larger than 14" x 22".
- **Decorated Cakes** – The use of forms or pans is recommended. Cakes should not exceed 12" in height or at the base. If multi-tiered cakes are made and exceed 12 inches in height, send only the top layer of the cake. Use Royal Icing, Rolled Fondant or commercial product (i.e. Dapp) that will harden and preserve the decoration on the cake pan or form. No real cakes or butter crème icing or tube/gel icing. Cake boards must not exceed 1" margin on each side of cake pan or form.

CONFERENCE JUDGING

Conference judging is a process where the judge interviews the member about their exhibit. Members can have up to four exhibits conference judged, but only one exhibit in a project area. That means that a member cannot have two craft items conference judged, even if the items are in different classes. The judge will award the ribbon for the item based on a combination of the interview and the quality of the exhibit. Members may wish to have items that "just didn't turn out quite right" conference judged. Items can be conference judged from 2:00 - 4:00 p.m., and from 5:00 - 6:00 p.m.

1. **All food items must include recipe card.** Food must be of reasonable quality to keep for 4 days. Do not send food items that will spoil quickly such as casseroles, pizza, cream pies; items made with cream cheese, etc.
2. Biscuits, cookies, muffins and other small items should be four per plate. Appearance is a factor as well as taste. Except for gift baskets, all food should be displayed on paper or disposable plates.
3. Cakes should be exhibited in mini-versions (portions of 1/3 to 1/4 of a larger total product.)
4. Wrap sample of each item in separate package as a sample for judging. Gift packages do not need samples.
5. Decorated cakes will be exhibited in the Cake Decorating project.

FOOD PRESERVATION -

EXAMPLES: Canned, dried, or pickled foods (no cured hams), gift package of preserved foods, educational displays, etc.

For safety reasons, all Food Arts exhibits must follow these rules:

1. All canned goods must be in standard canning jars, sealed with two-piece lids, and less than one year old. Bands should be in place for transporting jars but will be removed for judging.
2. Entries must be labeled with product name, date of preparation, processing method, length of processing time and recipe source. Example of a qualified label:
3. All foods must be canned according to 1989 or later USDA, Ball, or Kerr guidelines. Information on standard procedure is available from the University of Missouri Extension Center.
4. Any sign of spoilage or alteration from standard processing guidelines will be basis for disqualification of the exhibit.
5. No food should be sampled by judges.

GENERAL RULES FOR LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS

1. **All exhibits must be pre-registered.** All advanced registrations must be in the Franklin County University of Missouri Extension Center no later than 4:30 p.m. Friday, June 19.
2. Animals must be in place by the designated time on the day of the show. They will be released on the evening of the show, with the exact time to be determined by the 4-H Youth Specialist, and announced the evening of the show.

Stall area must be cleaned before animals are removed from the fair grounds. **Premiums will be forfeited if exhibits are removed before the time listed, or if stall area is not cleaned, unless written permission is obtained from Dave Hileman or Ken Bolte.**

3. Read health requirements.
4. The Franklin County Youth Fair Livestock shows are open to anyone age 8-18 by December 31, 2008 who is a member in good standing of a Franklin County 4-H Club, and who is enrolled in a livestock project of the species exhibited; or who is a member of a Franklin County FFA chapter. The show is also open to some 4-H and FFA members in surrounding counties. See rule 12 for more information.
5. Animals exhibited must be owned and shown by the exhibitor. If an exhibitor has more than one exhibit in a class, the exhibitor may recruit another youth exhibitor to show one of the animals.
6. Exhibitors vehicles may enter the fairgrounds if necessary until 11:30 a.m. through the northeast gate by the swimming pool (off Park Street). All vehicles must be off the fairgrounds by noon.
7. Bedding for livestock must be provided by exhibitor.
8. Judging will be based on the Danish System; all exhibits will receive a blue, red, or white ribbon. Prize money will be awarded based on the ribbon received. See class list for the points awarded to each class. Dollar value of points will be determined by the Franklin County Youth Fair Board.
9. Livestock exhibitors must use Livestock Entry Form
10. Exhibitors will be limited to two entries per single animal class and one entry per group class.
11. A stall fee of \$2.00 **per animal** for beef and dairy, \$1.00 **per animal** for sheep, swine, and goats, and 50 cents **per entry** for rabbits and poultry, must accompany advanced registration. Doe and litter, and pen classes will be considered as one entry. **Stall fees and exhibitor passes must be paid by separate checks.**
12. 4-H and FFA members outside of Franklin County must contact the Franklin County University of Missouri Extension Center, (636) 583-5141, to verify eligibility to show. **Out of county exhibitors are limited to \$100 in premiums.**
13. No trophy will be given unless there are two or more animals within a breed.
14. Showmanship: Trophies will be awarded in age divisions for Dairy, Beef, Swine, Sheep, Goat, Poultry, and Rabbits as listed below. Contestants must exhibit animals they own. **Must be 2 exhibitors before trophy is awarded.**

Beef, Poultry, and Rabbits will have 3 divisions:

- a. **Junior Showmanship – Contestants 8-10 years of age as of December 31, 2008.**
- b. **Intermediate Showmanship – Contestants 11-14 years of age as of December 31, 2008.**
- c. **Senior Showmanship – Contestants 15-18 years of age as of December 31, 2008.**

Dairy, Swine, Sheep and Goat will have 2 divisions:

- a. **Junior Showmanship – Contestants 8-12 years of age as of December 31, 2008**
- b. **Senior Showmanship – Contestants 13-18 years of age as of December 31, 2008**

ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITION - 2009

Please contact your veterinarian if you have questions.

HEALTH CERTIFICATES/General Requirements:

- A. **All animals must have a health certificate unless specifically exempted.** The health certificate must show required tests, vaccinations, etc., and individual identification and description of animals. Health certificates are valid for thirty (30) days
- B. Animals with ringworm lesions, easily visible warts, or other contagious diseases or conditions, will not exhibit and will have to be removed from community holding areas and stalls.
- C. The following listed entry requirements on livestock are for exhibition only. These minimal health and testing requirements do not qualify livestock that are to be sold or moved to a new owner or destination. Please investigate and comply with the added requirements for livestock that are to be in a sale as well as an exhibition.

EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS FOR CATTLE IN THE STATE OF MISSOURI

- A. Intrastate (cattle in Missouri moving for exhibition only in Missouri, no health certificate required).
 - 1. Brucellosis - no test or vaccination is required.
 - 2. Tuberculosis - no test is required.

EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS FOR SWINE IN MISSOURI

- A. Intrastate - (swine in Missouri moving for exhibition only in Missouri.) – no certificate of veterinary inspection is required.
 - 1. BRUCELLOSIS: No test is required.
 - 2. PSEUDORABIES: No test is required.

EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS FOR SHEEP

- A. Sheep that are to be exhibited must be free of clinical signs of an infectious or contagious disease. All animals must have a health certificate.
- B. All sheep must be identified to flock or origin using official ID (ear tags or tattoos) and listed individually on a certificate of veterinary inspection.
- C. Scabies
 - 1. Sheep from a scabies quarantined area must be dipped or treated by an officially approved method within (10) days prior to exhibition.
 - 2. A prior permit must be obtained and recorded on a certificate of veterinary inspection if the sheep are from a scabies quarantined area.

EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS FOR GOATS

- A. Intrastate (Goats in Missouri being exhibited in Missouri)
 - 1. All goats that are to be exhibited must be free of clinical signs of an infectious or contagious disease.
 - 2. All goats must be identified to farm of origin (using ear tags or tattoos) and listed on a certificate of veterinary inspection.

EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS FOR POULTRY:

- A. Poultry must have no signs of contagious or infectious disease. Poultry (except water fowl) must have a VS Form 9-2 (or similar certificate) showing a negative Pullorum -Typhoid test within the past ninety (90) days to exhibition, or originate from a flock approved by the National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP) with no change of ownership. A representative of the department shall have access to the event and may inspect or test poultry as considered necessary.
- B. Sponsors of any poultry exhibition must notify the state veterinarian at least thirty (30) days prior to the exhibition with names, places, dates and times of the event. The sponsor shall keep records for one (1) year, including owner information, species, breed, type and pullorum-typhoid status of poultry exhibited.

ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS FOR POULTRY AND RABBITS

- A. All rabbits and birds must be totally free of disease or parasites. Animals exhibiting parasites or disease will not be placed in the tent, and will be disqualified from the show.
 - 1. Animals will be checked for visible signs of parasites and disease before they are allowed under the tent.
