Premiums are paid based on point values. Premiums will be mailed to club leaders for distribution after the fair. (Note: For 2009 payment of cash premiums and/or amount of cash premiums may be dependent on availability of funds.)

SHOWMANSHIP AWARDS

Will be given in Beef, Dairy, Sheep, Swine, Goat and Poultry

Beef: Showmanship Awards will be judged in three age groups: 8 & 9, 10-12, and 13 & over; with 4-H age based on Jan. 1, 2009. After a 4-H member wins in their age division, the following year they must compete in the next age division. **Once they have won the "overall" showmanship honor they then become ineligible to participate in showmanship at future Greene County 4-H Fairs.**

Dairy, Sheep, Swine & Poultry: Showmanship Awards are not judged in age groups, one overall award is given in each division. **The winner may not compete for this award the following year.** Prior to the 4-H Fair, Poultry exhibitors will receive showmanship study guides to help them prepare for the showmanship competition.

Goat: Showmanship Awards will be judged in two age groups. Jr ages 8-12 (meat & dairy together) and Sr. ages 13 and over (meat & dairy together). Regardless if the exhibitor has won a showmanship award during the previous 4-H Fair, they are still eligible to compete in the Goat Showmanship competition the following year.

Herdsman Awards

There will be a Herdsman Award given to someone from each of the following categories: Dairy, Beef, Swine, Sheep, Goat, Poultry, and Rabbit. Judging is based on: Decoration and attractiveness of exhibit (20 points); Clean, neat and presentable exhibit area (60 points); Cooperation with fair management and promptness in show ring (20 points) and completeness of entry forms (20 points). Herdsman scorecard is included in the 4-H Fair Book so exhibitors will have an understanding of the Herdsman judging criteria. It is recommended that this scorecard be reviewed by the exhibitor!

Joe Fielden Traveling Trophy

Greene County 4-H Fair Livestock and Dairy High Point Club

Award is given in honor of Mr. Joe Fielden, a longtime volunteer of 4-H, to the club accumulating the most points from exhibiting at the Greene County 4-H Fair in beef and dairy shows.

Shaffer Angus Farm Beef Traveling Trophy

Award is given to the club accumulating the most points at the Greene County 4-H Fair in the areas of beef exhibits, live animal demonstrations and livestock judging. Scores will only be counted for those members who participate in all three areas.

Grievance Procedure

Should a problem arise during the 4-H Fair, the problem should first be taken to the Chairperson or Superintendent in charge of that particular area. However, if the question or problem cannot be settled, the problem should then be brought to the attention of the 4-H Fair Committee. The 4-H Fair Committee will use their best judgment in resolving the issue which may include, but not be limited to, the following options:

- Discussion with involved parties and Superintendent in charge to determine a resolution
- Appoint an Ad Hoc Committee during the 4-H Fair consisting of other area Superintendents to determine a resolution
- Appoint an Ad Hoc Committee consisting of other area Superintendents to determine a resolution after the end of the 4-H Fair
- Present the issue at the next scheduled Leader's Council meeting to determine a resolution.

2009 – Missouri Show Me Quality Assurance Policy

All 4-H members enrolled in food animal projects (including beef, sheep, swine, dairy cattle, meat and dairy goats, rabbits, and poultry) must complete the appropriate level of Missouri Show Me Quality Assurance (MSMQA) certification to be considered a 4-H Member in good standing in that project. Other county good standing guidelines may also apply. Check with your local 4-H Youth Specialist for current local guidelines. Food animal project members showing at the Missouri State Fair should be prepared to present their MSMQA card at check-in.

Greene County 4-H Fair Food Animal Project Exhibitors SHOULD include a copy of their MSMQA certification card with 4-H Fair Livestock Entry Form. Additionally, Exhibitors SHOULD be prepared to present their MSMQA card at check-in if requested by the Superintendent.

Definition of Missouri Show Me Quality certification status terms:

Because of the complexity of the MSMQA information, youth age 8 – 13 need to have repeated exposure to the material. Using a quality assurance "injection" analogy, youth age 8 – 13 need two vaccines and a booster. This means they (youth 8 – 13) will need to take MSMQA two (2) consecutive times (vaccines) then one more time when they turn 14 (booster).

Youth 14 and over only need to attend the training or pass the tutorial one time. See MSMQA Certified below.

(Ages are determined by January 1 of the program year)

"MSMQA Qualified to Show" means the 4-H member (age 8 – 13) has participated in Missouri Show Me Quality Assurance in either the face to face training or tutorial by June 1 of the 4-H program year. (To continue with the analogy from above, this is the first "vaccine").

"MSMQA Conditionally Certified" this is the second "vaccine" for youth age 8 to 13. Conditionally certified means the member has participated in two consecutive years of MSMQA training or tutorial. Once they obtain a conditional status they

do not have to take a "booster" course until they are 14 (age by January 1). Upon completion of the "booster" course they would be MSMQA *Certified* for the remainder of their youth exhibition career in 4-H.

"MSMQA Certified" "Certified" applies to youth in 4-H who have turned 14 by January 1. Upon completion of MSMQA in either a face to face or tutorial no further training will be required for the remainder of their youth exhibition career.

*As print date of this book **Ozark Empire Fair** has not declared their policy on this subject for 2009.

General Rules and Regulations Greene County 4-H Livestock Shows

I. Objectives of 4-H Livestock and Dairy Shows

- A. To develop leadership, initiative, self-reliance and other desirable character traits.
 - 1. Development of boys and girls through their experience in animal care justifies the event of a livestock show.
 - 2. A learning experience is the primary objective, winning is secondary and the animals are merely teaching tools.
- B. To provide opportunities to learn breeding, feeding, management, and grooming subject matter and skills.
 - 1. Show provides unlimited learning experiences.
 - 2. Designed to be more educational than competitive.
- C. To provide a setting where decision-making and judging ability (evaluation of differences) can be learned.
- D. To provide fun and enjoyment as a part of learning practical skills and subject matter.

II. RULES AND REGULATIONS---ALL YOUTH SPENDING THE NIGHT MUST BE SUPERVISED BY PARENT, GUARDIAN OR CLUB LEADER.

A. Enrollment

- 1. Re-enrolling Greene County 4-H Members must be officially enrolled (Y630, 4-H Member Enrollment Form) at the county Extension Center by November 1st. New en-rolling member by January 1st of current 4-H year on said form.
- 2. Each participant must be enrolled in the 4-H Livestock project which they are showing in, must be in good standing within their local club, which includes attendance at a majority of project meetings held and has attended half of the club meetings held after the 4-Her enrolls to the date of the show.
- 3. The deadline for adding additional projects to a 4-H Member's enrollment will be as follows: For re-enrolling members that are enrolled by November 1, they may add additional projects to their enrollment until January 1, as long as they have approval from both their Club Leader and Project Leader. For new members that must be enrolled by January 1, they may add additional projects to their enrollment until March 1, as long as they have approval from both their Club Leader and Project Leader.

B. Age

- 1. Minimum Age: Must have passed their 8th birthday by January 1, of the current year. All 4-H ages are based on January 1 of current year.

C. Ownership

- 1. The 4-H member must own all livestock and dairy used as projects.
- 2. 4-H members may own 4-H project livestock in partnership with other 4-H and/or FFA members who are immediate (brother/sister) family members. In the case of breeding livestock, they may have them registered jointly with immediate family members.
- 3. All registration papers must be present at check in.
- 4. All unregistered animals will show in commercial classes.

Ownership Dates

Beef Cattle – Steers – March 15
Beef Cattle – Breeding Animals – June 1
Sheep – Breeding Animals – July 1
Sheep – Market Lambs – June 15
Swine – Breeding Gilts – 90 days
Swine – Breeding Boars – since farrowing
Swine – Market Hogs – May 15
Dairy Cattle – All Dairy Cattle – June 1

Dairy Goats – June 1
Meat Goats – Breeding and Market – June 15
Dogs – April 1
Horses – May 1
Rabbits – Breeding – June 1
Rabbits – Meat Pen – 5 to 10 weeks prior to show
Poultry – Meat Pen – 8 to 10 weeks prior to show

D. Showing

1. The individual 4-H owner **must show all entries unassisted**. Another 4-H member may assist in showing an animal in case of illness or physical handicap, or when two animals are shown in the same class. Animals must be presented before the judge unassisted by adults. No more than two premiums will be paid per livestock exhibitor per class. EXHIBITORS ARE ENCOURAGED TO DRESS APPROPRIATELY. **DAIRY: please note dress code for showing.**
2. If any **alcohol**, drugs or fireworks are found or are being used on the premises by a family member or the exhibitor they will be asked to leave, and premiums will be forfeited.
3. Exhibitors should be responsible for the care and grooming of their own animals with no outside professional help. (Professional help outside the immediate family). The 4-H Member's official project leader may assist when needed. (Leader must be enrolled with Greene County 4-H and have cleared a background screening.)
4. At least one adult from each club must participate in a majority of the Leaders' Council meetings by and including the April meeting for their club members to be eligible to participate in any county 4-H event during the year.
5. No animals receiving red or white ribbons will be considered for reserve or grand champion. No Junior or Senior Champion rosettes will be awarded where there is no competition.
6. Any unethical practices will not be tolerated; failure to provide food water and bedding is grounds for dismissal from showing.
7. **For a Greene County 4-H member to be eligible to show livestock at OEF they must participate at the Greene County 4-H Fair, July 3-4, 2009. Participation constitutes either an exhibit in the exhibit room (in any project enrolled) or showing in livestock show.**

E. Bathing

1. No Beef, Dairy or cattle animals are to be washed in the swine, sheep wash racks. If you do wash in this barn you will lose premiums.

F. Housing

1. All livestock will be housed in Barns 2 and 3 (the sheep and swine buildings)
2. No livestock will be allowed in the horse stalling area and no horses will be allowed in the livestock stalling area.
3. Stalls will be grouped by club and assigned by the department superintendent.
4. All straw and manure must be placed in pits only. If bedding material or manure is placed in trashcans or beside barns, a clean-up fee of \$25 per incident will be charged.
5. Bedding materials such as sawdust, newspaper and bark material are prohibited. Straw and wood chips are appropriate.
6. No animals may be washed in the streets. All washing of animals must be done in appropriate wash racks.

G. Entries

1. Pre-Entry is required. Entries due in Extension Office, **June 15**. This deadline will be enforced. Substitutions can be made for any animal entered but additions will not be allowed.

H. Milking

1. There absolutely will be no dumping on the fairgrounds or in the sewers. Milk cans are not available.

I. Arrival Time

1. All sheep, swine, goats, dairy, beef, poultry, rabbits, as well as bedding and tack **MUST** be in place by 12:00 noon, Friday, July 3rd; premiums will not be awarded on any livestock not in place by 12:00 noon, July 3rd.

2. Bedding may be placed in stalls during business hours of 8:00 to 5:00 p.m. the day previous to the 4-H Fair. The MEEC/OEF accepts no responsibility for the loss or damage to your property.

J. Release Time (as voted on by Leaders Council August, 2006)

1. All livestock shall be released at the conclusion of the Awards Presentations Ceremony on Saturday, July 4, 2009.
2. If a 4-H Member is going to request an early release for his/her livestock, this request must be presented to, and permission granted by, the Greene County Leader's Council. Ideally the 4-H Member will attend Leader's Council to request the early release, but a representative for the member (i.e. a family member, project leader or club leader) may also attend Leader's Council to request the early release. The early release request must be made prior to the 4-H Fair at a regularly scheduled Leader's Council Meeting. The decision to approve an early release request will be at the discretion of the Leader's Council. If the early release is approved by Leader's Council, any premiums earned by the 4-H member will still be awarded. If an early release IS NOT approved by Leader's Council and the 4-H Member chooses to leave the 4-H Fair prior to the designated release time listed above, then any premiums earned will be forfeited.

III. ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITION

The following is a SUMMARY, and not a reprint of 2 CSR 30-2.040 Animal Health Requirements for exhibition regulations. Contact the Missouri State Veterinarian's office at (573) 751-4359 for clarification on the following.

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection/General Requirements.

A. All animals must have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection or a paper copy of an electronic Certificate of Veterinary Inspection unless specifically exempted. The Certificate of Veterinary Inspection shall state that the animals are free of visible signs of contagious, infectious, or communicable disease, describe the animal(s) by species, breed, sex and age. The Certificate of Veterinary Inspection shall reflect all data for required test and vaccinations, all dates, results and the name of the laboratory.

B. The Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is valid for thirty (30) days.

C. Animals with active lesions of ringworm or warts will not be permitted to exhibit and shall be subject to isolation and expulsion.

D. Sales scheduled in association with exhibitions must employ a veterinarian to examine animals and process Certificate of Veterinary Inspection for change of ownership. The following are requirements for animals EXHIBITED in Missouri. Animal sold in addition to being exhibited must meet the entry requirements of Missouri.

2. EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS FOR CATTLE IN MISSOURI.

A. Intrastate (cattle in Missouri moving for exhibition only).

1. No Certificate of Veterinary Inspection required.
2. Brucellosis – no test or vaccination is required.
3. Tuberculosis – no test is required.

B. Interstate (cattle from another state entering Missouri for exhibition only).

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is required with official individual identification for each animal listed.
2. Brucellosis –
 - A. Cattle from Brucellosis-Free States.
 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection required with official individual identification for each animal listed.
 2. All cattle may enter without a brucellosis test
 3. Steer(s). No test required but the steer(s) must be listed and identified on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
 - B. Sexually intact cattle from brucellosis Class A states. All test-eligible animals must be tested and negative within thirty (30) days prior to entry except cattle from a certified brucellosis-free herd. The certified herd number and date of the last herd test date must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection; and
 - C. Rodeo bulls from a Class A state must have a negative brucellosis test within twelve (12) months.

3. Tuberculosis.

A. Beef – all beef breeding cattle six (6) months of age or over

must meet one of the following requirements:

1. Originate from a tuberculosis-free state.
2. Originate from a tuberculosis-accredited free herd. The herd number and current herd date must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection;
3. Test negative within sixty (60) days of exhibition.

B. Dairy – all sexually intact dairy cattle six (6) months of age and older must meet one of the following requirements:

1. Negative to an official tuberculosis test within sixty (60) days prior to exhibition;
2. Originate from an accredited tuberculosis-free herd. The herd number and current herd test date must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

C. All cattle, eighteen months of age and older, used for rodeo or time events must have a negative tuberculosis test within twelve (12) months of exhibition.

3. EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS FOR SWINE

A. Intrastate (swine in Missouri moving for exhibition only)

1. All swine must be free of clinical signs of infectious or contagious disease.
2. No Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is required
3. Brucellosis – no test required
4. Pseudorabies – no test required

B. Interstate (swine from another state entering Missouri for exhibition only).

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is required. All swine must be identified by eartag, ear notch, tattoo and individually listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
2. Brucellosis –
 - A. Breeding swine originating from brucellosis-free states may exhibit without a brucellosis test.
 - B. Breeding swine originating from a brucellosis stage II states must be tested negative within sixty (60) days prior to exhibition except breeding swine from a validated brucellosis-free herd. The validated herd number and date of last validating test must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
3. Pseudorabies –
 - A. Swine originating from a state classified as Stage V the National Pseudorabies (PRV) Eradication Plan may exhibit without a pseudorabies test.
 - B. All other swine must be tested negative within sixty (60) days prior to exhibition except swine from a qualified pseudorabies-free herd. The qualified herd number and date of last qualifying test must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

4. EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS FOR SHEEP.

- A. Intrastate (sheep in Missouri moving for exhibition only).
 1. Sheep must be free of clinical signs of an infectious or

- contagious disease.
2. All sheep, including wethers, must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection or a paper copy of an electronic Certificate of Veterinary Inspection showing official identification (eartag, electronic implant or registration tattoo). If electronic implants are used for identification; owner/manager must provide electronic implant reader.
 3. No test required
- B. Interstate (sheep from another state entering Missouri for exhibition only)
1. Sheep must be free of clinical signs of an infectious or contagious disease.
 2. All sheep, including wethers, must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection or a paper copy of an electronic Certificate of Veterinary Inspection showing official identification (eartag, electronic implant or registration tattoo). If electronic implants are used for identification, owner/manager must provide electronic implant reader.
 3. No test required
5. EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS FOR GOATS.
- A. Intrastate (goats in Missouri moving for exhibition only)
1. Goats must be free of clinical signs of an infectious or contagious disease.
 2. All goats, including wethers, must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection or a paper copy of an electronic Certificate of Veterinary Inspection showing official identification (eartag, electronic implant or registration tattoo). If electronic implants are used for identification, owner/manager must provide electronic implant reader.
 3. No test required
- B. Interstate (goats from another state entering Missouri for exhibition only).
1. Goats must be free of clinical signs of an infectious or contagious disease
 2. All goats, including wethers, must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection or a paper copy of an electronic Certificate of Veterinary Inspection showing official identification (eartag, electronic implant or registration tattoo). If electronic implants are used for identification, owner/manager must provide electronic implant reader.
 3. No test required
6. EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS EQUINE.
- A. Intrastate (equine in Missouri moving for exhibition only).
1. Equine that are to be exhibited must be free of clinical signs of an Infectious or contagious disease. Any equine showing signs of infectious or contagious diseases at an exhibition may be excused by the official inspecting veterinarian. When an official inspecting veterinarian is present; all equine will be subject to daily inspection.
 2. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is not required.
 3. All equine (except nursing foals accompanied by their dams) must be accompanied by a current VS Form 10-11 or any officially recognized state EIA test chart showing the graphic description of all markings needed for identification, or microchip, or legible tattoo, or unique registered brand. A certified photocopy or certified facsimile of the VS Form 10-11 or any officially recognized state EIA test chart may be accepted for the purpose of exhibition.
- B. Interstate (equine from another state entering Missouri for exhibition only).
1. Equine that are to be exhibited must be free of clinical signs of an infectious or contagious disease. Any equine showing signs of infectious or contagious diseases at an exhibition may be excused by the official inspecting veterinarian. When an official inspecting veterinarian is present; all equine will be subject to daily inspection.
 2. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is required.
 3. All equine (except nursing foals accompanied by their dams) must be accompanied by a current VS Form 10-11 or any officially recognized state EIA test chart showing the graphic description of all markings needed for identification, or microchip, or legible tattoo, or unique registered brand. A certified photocopy or certified facsimile of the VS Form 10-11 or any officially recognized state EIA test chart may be accepted for the purpose of exhibition.
 4. Alteration or substitution of any information on any VS Form 10-11 including certified photocopy or certified facsimile or any official copy of a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection shall cause the document to be invalid and in violation of sections 267.010 to 267.730, RSMo, and may result in civil penalties not to exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) per violation and subject to expulsion.
5. A six (6) - month passport from states with which there is a reciprocal agreement will be accepted in lieu of VS Form 10-11. These passports must have proof of a negative EIA test within thirty (30) days of the date of application of the passport and permanent identification for each horse by means of registered brand, legible tattoo, or microchip to be recorded on the passport and the VS Form 10-11 or any officially recognized state EIA test chart, along with other identifying characteristics. In the event of confirmed vesicular stomatitis in any of the states with which reciprocal agreements exist, use of the six (6) – month passport will be suspended by the state veterinarian of Missouri.
6. Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis (VEE) vaccination and entry permit is required prior to entry on equine originating from states in which VEE has been diagnosed within the preceding twelve (12) months.
7. Any equine originating from a premise under quarantine for Vesicular Stomatitis shall obtain an entry permit and must include the statement on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection that “the equine listed have not been exposed to Vesicular Stomatitis or located within (10) miles of premises quarantined for Vesicular Stomatitis within the past thirty (30) days”.
- C. The board, organization or manager of each assembly or event is responsible for certifying that all equine admitted or participating meet the regulations in this section and shall not admit or allow participation of equine not so certified. Untested equine shall not be allowed to congregate with other equine. The owner of each animal shall comply with requirements under this section 267.010. to 267.730, RSMo, and may be assessed civil penalties not to exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) for each violation.
7. EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS FOR POULTRY AND WATERFOWL
- A. Intrastate (poultry and waterfowl in Missouri moving for exhibition only)
1. All poultry and waterfowl to be exhibited must be free of clinical signs of any infectious or contagious disease.
 2. No Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is required
 3. Pullorum-Typhoid test. All poultry (except waterfowl) exhibited shall be tested negative for pullorum-typhoid within ninety (90) days prior to exhibition or originate from a flock approved by the National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP) or an equivalent program which as been tested within the past twelve (12) months with no change of ownership. This information shall be documented on a VS Form 9-2 (see 2 CSR 30-8.020) or similar certificate which shall accompany the poultry to the exhibition and shall be made available on request.
- B. Interstate (poultry and waterfowl entering Missouri for exhibition only)
1. All poultry and waterfowl to be exhibited must be free of clinical signs of any infectious or contagious disease.
 2. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is required
 3. Pullorum-Typhoid test. All poultry (except waterfowl) exhibited shall be tested negative for pullorum-typhoid within ninety (90) days prior to exhibition or originate from a flock approved by the National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP) or an equivalent program which as been tested within the past twelve (12) months with no change of ownership. This information shall be documented on a VS Form 9-2 (see 2 CSR 30-8.020) or similar certificate which shall accompany the poultry to the exhibition and shall be made available on request.
 4. An entry permit is required.
- C. Requirements for Sponsoring Exhibitions for Poultry and Waterfowl.
1. An official representing the person or organization sponsoring the exhibition shall notify the state veterinarian no later than thirty (30) days prior to the exhibition giving the names, place, inclusive dates and times of event.
 2. Record Keeping. The sponsor of the exhibition shall compile a list of all poultry and waterfowl present at the exhibition. The list shall contain the name and address of each owner, the number, species, breed, variety, type, sex and pullorumtyphoid

status of all poultry present. A copy of this list shall be retained by the sponsor of the exhibition for at least twelve (12) months and shall be made available upon request to a representative of the department.

3. Inspection. All poultry and waterfowl to be exhibited must be free of clinical signs of any Infectious or contagious disease. A representative of the department shall have access to the exhibits and may conduct inspections and tests as deemed necessary.

8. EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS FOR RATITE IN THE STATE OF MISSOURI

A. Intrastate (ratites in Missouri moving for exhibition only).

1. All ratites to be exhibited must be free of clinical signs of any infectious or contagious disease.
2. No Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is required.
3. Ratites must be officially identified by leg band, wing band or microchip.
4. No test is required.

B. Interstate (ratites from another state entering Missouri for exhibition only).

1. All ratites to be exhibited must be free of clinical signs of any infectious or contagious disease.
2. Ratites must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary inspection showing official identification (leg band, wing band or microchip).
3. No test is required
4. An entry permit is required.

9. EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS FOR CAMELS, LLAMAS, AND ALPACAS.

A. Intrastate (camels, llamas, alpacas in Missouri moving for exhibition only).

1. No Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is required.
2. No testing is required.

B. Interstate (camels, llamas, alpacas entering Missouri for exhibition

only)

1. All camels, llamas, alpacas must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection showing official identification (legible tattoo, microchip, or eartag).
2. No testing is required.
3. No entry permit is required.

10. EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS FOR DOGS AND CATS.

A. Intrastate (dogs and cats in Missouri moving for exhibition only).

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is not required.
2. Dogs and cats four (4) months of age or older must be vaccinated for rabies by one (1) of the methods and within the time period published in the current *Compendium of Animal Rabies Vaccines* by the National Association of State Public Health Veterinarians, Inc.

B. Interstate (dogs and cats from another state entering Missouri for exhibition only).

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is not required.
2. Dogs and cats four (4) months of age or older must be vaccinated for rabies by one (1) of the methods and within the time period published in the current *Compendium of Animal Rabies Vaccines* by the National Association of State Public Health Veterinarians, Inc.
3. No entry permit is require

IV. LIVE ANIMAL DEMONSTRATIONS

Rules and Regulations for Live Animal Demonstrations

1. A member must be enrolled in the project in which they demonstrate; a live animal must be used in a Live Animal Demonstration.
2. A member may have one helper to assist in handling the animal while they speak or to help set up physical equipment that could be difficult to handle by oneself.
3. Members have a maximum of 15 minutes for their demonstration. Twenty minutes for a team.
4. Live animal demonstrations do not advance to Regional 4-H Achievement Day. However 4-H members may videotape their demonstrations at the county contest. If their demonstration is then judged as one of the top two in the project, they may present their video at Regional, Monday, July 20, 2009, at OTC. The member is responsible for the video taping if they desire to enter the video demonstration contest.
5. Entries are due, **June 15, 2009**, the same as all other livestock entries.
6. A cordless microphone system will be available.
7. A member may borrow an animal if needed for their demonstration, but they are responsible for making all necessary arrangements with the owner.
8. A copy of the Demonstration Scorecard has been included in the Fair Book so that exhibitors will have an understanding of the Demonstration judging criteria.
