#### COUNTY FAIR ANIMAL CARE COMMITTEE POLICY STATEMENT

The Atchison County Fair is the showplace for animal agriculture for the county. All animals and livestock shown, housed, or displayed shall receive care that is humane, healthful, and consistent with accepted practices. Cruelty, neglect, or indifference to animal comfort will not be tolerated and will constitute grounds for removal from the premises. Animal care shall be consistent with sound husbandry practices and with rules and regulations set by the Atchison County Fair Board. Professional veterinary care will be provided as needed. Animals experiencing illness, injury, or discomfort will be professionally attended to only by a licensed veterinarian. Exhibits shall reflect the care and concern that Missourians have for livestock, poultry, companion animals, and wildlife.

#### GENERAL LIVESTOCK RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1. The 2021 Missouri State Fair livestock rules will be followed, with the following exceptions:
- 2. Exhibitor must be officially enrolled in a 4-H program or FFA Chapter.
- 3. Ownership deadlines: breeding gilts, 90 days; market hogs, 90 days; breeding sheep, 7/1; market lambs, 6/1; breeding does, 6/1; market goats, 6/1; breeding beef, 6/1; market beef, 3/1; rabbits, 6/1; meat pen of rabbits, 5-10 weeks prior to show; meat pen of poultry, 5-10 weeks prior to show; all other poultry, 8 weeks prior to show.
- 4. All large animals (sheep, goats, swine, and beef cattle) will be required to have health certificates to show at the Atchison County Fair. BEFORE UNLOADING you must show health papers to a fair board member at the office. This includes pee-wees and is MANDATORY, with NO EXCEPTIONS, or you will be sent home.
- 5. Exhibitors must bring their own feed, water buckets, pans, and bedding. Hogs will bed on east side of hog barn. Washing will not be allowed in hog pens. There will be designated areas for used bedding.
- 6. Exhibitors must wear the official show t-shirt provided by the Fair Board during the shows and auction.
- 7. Exhibitors must show their own animals unless there are extenuating circumstances, in which case the exhibitor must notify the specie superintendent in a timely manner prior to the show. The livestock committee will rule on the final decision. Only bonafide county exhibitor or family member may show in an exhibitor's place.
- 8. The same animal is not allowed to show in both breeding and market classes.
- 9. Uncontrollable animals may be dismissed from the show ring by the superintendent or the fair board president.
- 10. All livestock classified by Danish System: Blue, Red, and White.
- 11. Any grievance must be voiced before the end of the show to the show superintendent and Fair Board president.
- 12. The livestock show will follow the animal health requirements for the 2021 Missouri State Fair (visit: www.mostatefair.com for requirements).
- 13. No intact males of any species will be allowed to show, with the exception of feeder calves, poultry, and rabbits.
- 14. All animals that sell at auction must show.
- 15. An exhibitor may **sell a maximum of ONE (1) animal in the auction.** Auction animals can include breeding or market livestock, bucket calves, poultry, and rabbits. Feeder calves cannot be sold in the auction.
- 16. Buyers will bid the premium on dollars per animal starting from \$0. Buyers pay premium bid the day of the sale.
- 17. The Atchison County Fair Board will make arrangements for hogs to be delivered to sale barn or packing plant.
- 18. Exhibitors have 1 calendar year to cash premium checks.
- 19. All animals in sheep and cattle barns need to be removed by 10pm Friday evening or all money earned will be forfeited and good standings will be compromised for the following year per the fair board's discretion.

## ATCHISON COUNTY MARKET LIVESTOCK RULES

- 1. Weigh-day is optional, but market animals must be weighed at weigh-day to be eligible for the rate-of-gain contest and in-county champion.
- 2. To choose in-county champion, grand champions will stand as in-county champion. If there are no grand champions, reserve champions will stand as in-county. If there are no grand or reserve champions, the top placing in-county animals from each class will compete for in-county champion.

## **SHOWMANSHIP GUIDELINES**

- 1. Showmanship classes include both breeding and market animals.
- 2. The exhibitor must show his/her own animal during the showmanship class.
- 3. Prizes will be awarded for Champion Showmanship in each of the three showmanship classes: 11 yrs and under, 12-16 yrs, and 17 yrs and older. Age is as of January 1, year of show.

## **MARKET SWINE RULES:**

- 1. All market hogs must be registered, weighed, and on grounds from 6-8 pm for in-county and 7:00-8:00 a.m. out-of-county, day of show.
- 2. Market classes will be divided by weight. Pen classes will be determined by total weight of group.
- 3. An exhibitor may have one (1) pen-of-three market hogs total. If the hogs are mixed market and breeding animals, two of the three must have shown as market animals, and the third must have shown in a breeding class.

# **POULTRY**

#### **GENERAL POULTRY SHOW RULES:**

- 1. Ownership for meat pen of birds is 5-10 weeks prior to the show and eight weeks prior to the show for all other poultry.
- 2. Participants must furnish their own cages or carriers and other supplies.
- 3. Poultry exhibits will be judged in accordance with the American Poultry Association Standard of Perfection.
- 4. Poultry trio exhibits must be different birds from single exhibits.
- 5. All poultry except waterfowl present at exhibitions in Missouri shall have originated from U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid clean or equivalent flocks, or have had a negative pullorum-typhoid test with ninety (90) days of the movement to the exhibition. This information will be documented on a VS form 9-2 or similar certificate, which will accompany the poultry during the exhibition. All poultry shall be free of any evidence of infectious or contagious disease.

## **PEE-WEE POULTRY RULES:**

1. Pee-Wee poultry class is open to youth 2-7 years of age as of January 1, year of show. Any participant under 4 years of age must be accompanied by an adult, or by a livestock exhibitor in the intermediate or senior showmanship divisions.

#### **HOME ARTS**

#### GENERAL RULES:

- 1. Exhibits MUST be projects completed this year (since July 20, 2020).
- 2. All exhibits must be the work of exhibitor.
- 3. There will be a limit of two exhibits per class. If more are signed up anything after first two will be disqualified and only displayed for viewing.
- 4. Exhibits must have an entry tag. These may be picked up ahead of time at the University of Missouri Atchison County Extension Office, 201 East Highway 136, Rock Port, before the fair.
- 5. Any exhibits with no class number will not be judged and therefore will receive no ribbon or premium money.
- 6. All articles will be judged in the class entered.
- 7. All articles will be under the supervision of the superintendents and volunteers at sign in table during open exhibit hours. Care will be taken to prevent loss and damage of exhibit. The Atchison County Fair Board will not be responsible for any damage or loss.
- 8. All exhibits must be entered on July 21 from 4:00-7:00 p.m. or July 22 from 8:00-10:00 a.m. at the Velma Houts Fair Building, 201 East Hwy 136, Rock Port. Items brought in after this time will not be accepted. Please do not bring multiple items to enroll in last fifteen minutes of time allotted.
- 9. The exhibit area will be closed for judging on Wednesday, July 21 from 10:00 a.m.- 1:00 p.m.
- 10. See fair schedule for viewing times.
- 11. **All exhibits will be released Friday, July 23 at 3:00-5:00 p.m.** No exhibits will be released prior to this time.
- 12. Ribbons will be awarded to the top three exhibits in each class: one first place-blue, one second place-red, one third place-white. All other exhibits in a class will be awarded a participation ribbon.
- 13. Rosettes will be awarded to three outstanding exhibits in each section of those divisions judged. These will be selected from the blue ribbon exhibits in each section.
- 14. Premium money will be awarded to the top three exhibits in each class of all divisions that are judged. (Blue-\$8.00; Red-\$6.00; White-\$4.00)
- 15. Premium money can be collected when exhibits are released. If you are not able to pick up your item talk to home arts superintendent to make arrangements for someone else to pick them up. All premium money not collected at this time will be forfeited to the Atchison County Fair.
- 16. 4-H youth may enter items (no the same item) in 4-H Achievement Day, youth divisions, and open classes.
- 17. Exhibitors eligible for the Senior Division must have turned 60 by July 1, year of show.
- 18. Each division may have specific rules. These are listed at beginning of each section.

#### \*FOOD PRESERVATION\*

- 1. Only standard pints or quarts may be used except that a standard one-half pint jelly jar may be used for a jam, jelly, or preserves.
- 2. Preserved food will not be opened.
- 3. An exhibit is one jar of canned food.
- 4. All jars must be labeled as to contents and date of processing. A recipe on a 3x5 card must accompany the entry to determine method (water-bath vs. pressure) of canning. Fruits and pickle products must be processed using a boiling water bath. Vegetables, meat and poultry must be pressure-canned, and jelly products must be processed in a simmering or boiling water bath. Note: The method of canning also indicates the use of appropriate canning equipment.
- 5. Recommended preservation methods and procedures are available from the University of Missouri Extension Office.
- 6. There is no substitute for a safe recipe or correct processing, the following entries will be disqualified:
  - Paraffin sealed sweet spreads
  - Jars with zinc lids
  - Foods in green glass jars or non-standard jars
  - Jars with more than 2" headspace
  - Iars without a vacuum seal
  - Foods that have been improperly processed or packed
  - Foods in colored glass jars or non-standard jars

## **DEPARTMENT H - HORTICULTURE**

### Rules

- 1. Division I is for adults, Division II is for youth age 5-18.
- 2. Each entry must have a label showing department, division, class number, cultivar/variety name, and name of exhibitor.
- 3. Exhibitors may have more than one entry per class in Sections A-D only when the entries are different in variety, cultivar or color (e.g. red onions and white onions, red rose and white rose, or in named varieties, a different name). Exhibitors may have only one entry per class in the Design section.
- 4. If more than one item is required for vegetable or fruit display, items must be placed on a paper plate or foil pan. Exhibitors should provide their own containers for cut flowers (clear glass).
- 5. All exhibits in Sections A-D must be grown by the exhibitor except for potted plants, which should have been in their possession for at least six weeks before the fair. (This does not pertain to plant material used in designs. All designs must have been made by the exhibitor.)
- 6. No artificial plant material may be added to any design or any horticulture exhibit. Flags and religious symbols may not be used in any design.
- 7. A background may be used for designs but must be furnished by exhibitor. Accessories may also be used but are subordinate to the plant material and within the dimensions for the design.
- 8. The committee or helpers are not responsible for any breakage or loss.
- 9. For more information about exhibiting vegetables, contact the Extension Center and ask for guide 6230 "Exhibiting and Judging Garden Vegetables."
- 10. Any exhibits not picked up at checkout time will be forfeited. Premium monies will also be forfeited. Exhibitor may arrange for someone else to pick up.
- 11. Awards (Ribbons): One blue (1st), one red (2nd) and one white (3rd) ribbon may be awarded in each class. One blue, one red, and one white rosette may be awarded in each section as selected from the blue ribbon winners. However, if the number of entries is not sufficient in any section, then only the blue rosette may be awarded.
