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Dear 4-H Families,

During this time when we see the challenges before us, we are wondering what we are going to do and how are we going to get through this. I am reminded of an incident during my dad's Navy career that has helped me think through this situation that we are faced with today.

Towards the end of the Second World War in the Pacific there was an attack that was almost as devastating as Pearl Harbor. You almost never hear about this because the attacker was not the Japanese or the Germans, but Mother Nature. Just like the situation we now have.

As the Pacific Fleet was aiding General MacArthur in recapturing the Philippine Islands, the Leyte Gulf Battle to be specific, the battle groups were in need of refueling and my dad's task force was in charge of escorting the oilers in charge of refueling. It was December 1944.

My dad was assigned to the Destroyer Escort USS Rall (DE-304), as a Chief Gunner's Mate, they were all quite happy because as soon as they help refuel the ships that were in the Leyte Gulf, they had orders to escort a convoy back to Pearl Harbor and be there in time for Christmas.

They got the oilers there and were heading out with the convoy when they were hit by a typhoon (the Pacific version of a hurricane) There were several ships, most of them larger than the one dad was on, that were waiting to be refueled and had emptied their fuel/ballast tanks to receive fuel that were capsized because their skipper's panicked. You see if the ships are not ballasted right, they ride too high in the water and are very top heavy. In a typhoon, the waves can literally be higher than the ship. They can also list (turn side to side) as much as 60 to 70 degrees, enough that the decks can be level with the water. With that happening a ship that is not ballasted right can have water enter their air intakes and put their boiler fires out and be literally dead in the water, not a good thing in rough seas, the wind and waves will overcome the ship and if they get in a wave trough, they will capsize. The ships that were not lost were the ones where the skipper understood what was happening and refilled the ballast tanks with sea water and were not as top heavy and turned their ships into the wind and went full speed ahead. The same thing would happen, even if you were properly ballasted, if you didn't turn into the storm, you could also get caught in a wave trough and the waves would

capsize you.

Luckily, because of being ordered to return to Pearl Harbor, the Rall had already been refueled when the typhoon hit. Dad shared with me how their little destroyer escort survived. When the skipper realized that they were in the storm, he ordered the ship to turn into the waves and told the men to batten down the hatches and hold on. That they were not going to be sunk by capsizing, if they were going to sink, it would be because the ship broke apart.

Dad said that it was quite a ride. He indicated that it felt like they flew over one wave and went under two. He also told me that a lot of the rivets of the ship were leaking. The important part was that they didn't sink. They made it through, had Christmas at Pearl Harbor and went back to fight some more battles, like being hit by three kamikazes the same day, but that is for another story.

I know today that our "seas" look pretty rough and we are concerned about the outcome and that there are bigger and more powerful "ships" that are probably going to sink. (I know that we are going to survive) My challenge today is for us to "turn into the wind and batten down the hatches." Let's persevere, if we are going to sink it won't be because we turn tail and run, or because we were riding too high in the water and the storm put our fire out, it will be because we gave it all we had and we broke apart trying to beat the storm. I hope the infighting or the outside forces don't "sink" are ship. We will need to do some damage control, I'm sure...bailing water...just keeping us afloat. That might mean some funding sources that are not traditional or even long term but some that just might get us over the hump. Build and forge some new relationships and funding sources that we might not thought that we needed to do before, grants and contracts can't do it all, we need new sources and new places for funding.

I don't believe this time, simply doing our jobs is going to work. I think we need to work on strategy that will control the damages that seems to be thrown at us, not radical attack measures. It is not time to attack, but to defend ourselves, not to sit and say that this is just another storm, it will blow over, but it is a storm that could sink our ship. We need "all hands," 4-H members and volunteers for defense.

We need to look at different ways to defend ourselves; with this pandemic we're going through the mass rallies, large delegations and other activities that we have used in the past aren't an option anymore. We need to look for new ways to deliver our story and find alternative funding sources and new ways of doing what we call 4-H Youth Development. We need new and drastic measures, we need to look and think outside the box.

I had a professor in college tell us more than once, "Folks if we do what we have always done, we will get what we have always got." It is time to change the ways we do things. In the short run, we need to be sure that we are not in a panic, make sure we are not trying to turn back, make sure we are not standing still, but that we are turning into the storm and we are going to get through this.

Hold fast...Don't give up the ship!

Missouri State Fair Cattle Barn Project

For the 2020 Missouri State Fair, the sand will be removed from the cattle barn stalls and will be replaced with mulch bedding. A bedding fee of \$10 per head will be implemented for beef cattle exhibitors only. This fee will be collected along with beef cattle entries. Dairy cattle, which show toward the end of the Fair, will still be allowed to bring in their own straw to place on top of the mulch bedding.

Missouri State Fair Swine DNA Cards

The deadline for Missouri State Fair exhibitor swine DNA cards to be postmarked has been extended to June 15. This extension is to assist exhibitors with meeting the requirements of the DNA cards.

Other important dates and deadlines for exhibitors will continued to be reviewed and modified if necessary as situations change. Information will be posted on the Fair's website, <u>mostatefair.com</u>, as it becomes available.

Did you know that our 4-H Clover has the same prestige and protection as the Presidential Seal or the Olympic Symbol? All of us care deeply about 4-H programs and young people. As "keepers of the clover," we are responsible for ensuring that all aspects of the 4-H program are of the highest quality and in accordance with approved 4-H policies.

Good financial management is an important aspect of our responsibility to 4-H. Since 1998, the required financial policies for **any** Missouri 4-H organization (clubs, county councils, committees and other groups that use the 4-H name) have been laid out in the publication *Missouri 4-H Treasurer's Record Book Y672*. **All entities** (clubs, councils, committees) that use the 4-H name MUST use this record book and meet or exceed the policies outlined in this publication.


National Volunteer Week is Coming

Clover Kids Corner



Through Clover Kids clubs, children learn how to get along, share, and work in groups, explore their interests, and build self-confidence. Each Clover Kids Corner provides an activity, information or other materials that Clover Kids leaders can use in planning and implementing experiences that introduce five to seven-year olds to the 4-H concept of learning by doing.

Thank You Notes Teach a Lifelong Skill

Have you considered helping your Clover Kids write and send handwritten thank you notes? Teaching children to write thank you notes is a simple act that goes a long way in the development of good social skills. Here are a couple of suggestions to help you get your Clover Kids going: • Be positive. Briefly explain that the gift-giver will feel good knowing the present is appreciated. The way you talk about thank you notes will influence whether your children think of writing them as a chore or as something thoughtful they can do for someone who has done something thoughtful for them. • Give choices and help make writing thank you notes fun. For children that don't yet write encourage them to draw pictures. Provide a variety of interesting and colorful paper, pens/pencils, crayons/markers, glitter and glue. Let them choose the ones they will use. • Make the handwritten note a special message from the heart. Help children understand the effort they put into creating a thank you is just as valuable as the gift itself. • Be a good example and write letters! Children learn to be courteous and responsible by watching other adults.

Ideas for Making Thank You Stationery

Materials: • Stamps and pads • Stickers • Decorate plain note cards • Stencils • Use decorative-edged scissors • Directions: Cut thank you postcards from card stock • Make thumbprints with washable ink pads (make balloons, flowers, patterns, people, words, or a clover).

Seed Sprouts: Does Light Make a Difference?

Materials: • Sandwich bags • paper towels • navy beans • permanent marker • sprayer or mist bottle with water. Directions: Give each child two bags, two paper towels, and six to eight navy beans. Help them label their bags. Label one bag "with light" and label the other bag "without light." Fold the paper towels to fit inside each bag. Spray with water until the paper towels are saturated. Place several seeds in each bag. Seal the bags. Ask the children to take the bags home; tape one to a window and put the other one in a closet or somewhere with no light. Keep the paper towels damp. Check on the seeds daily. What happens?

Related activity: Take the children on a walk. Look under rocks or logs for seeds that have sprouted without the help of sunlight. What do they look like? What do you think will happen if they are kept in the sun?
