Dear 4-H Families,

Being in youth development for almost forty years I have had a tremendous opportunity to hear many outstanding motivational speakers. I have all kinds of notes that I have saved from these various speakers. One of the opportunities that working at home has provided is that I have been tidying up my notes. I ran across one the other day, and I am not sure when it was or who said it, but it brings to light some insights on how to cope with what is happening now.

We have been encouraged by our Extension Director Marshall Stewart to do five activities as we move forward. These are to innovate, partner, communicate, lead and serve. While reflecting about these this week I believe it was fortuitous to come across this note, I scribbled a few years back. The points that I wrote down were Dare to Believe (innovate); Dare to Change (partner); Dare to Speak Up (communicate); Dare to Stand Strong (lead) and Dare to Trust (serve).

Dare to Believe (Innovate) - When we believe in ourselves it is easy to be innovative. If we believe in what we have and how to adapt it to what we are going through, then the end result will always be innovative. Over the years I have always tried to use the resources that are available to adapt them to what I need to do. Necessity, is said to be the mother of invention, whether it is using an old inner tube and baling wire to fix a pipe leak, so we can have water for overnight, or being adaptive to how we get club attendance and project hours in to complete our projects, we need to look at the big picture and at the spirit of law instead of the letter of the law.

Dare to Change (Partner) – There is a lot of truth in the old adage "two is better than one and a rope of many strands is not easily broken." However, I find it very difficult to ask for help. Change, except from a vending machine, is inevitable. Reaching out to others, finding partners is challenging. You may have to change what you are doing a little to allow someone to help you. From my agriculture background I know that when you cross breed, the result is better than either of the parents. We also know from economics that businesses that complement each other and work together are better than those that compete. We just have to be willing to find that partner and change, not our missions, but tweak the differences so that both identities are better for the partnership.

Dare to Speak Up (Communicate) - Communicating is more than just talking. Speaking up is sometimes needed to communicate. A lot of times in a group and/or partnership it is easy to ignore a problem or an issue for the sake of "getting along", not "rocking the boat", not "wanting to cause a problem" when in fact the issue only gets larger. I refer to them as a "gorilla in the corner" or the "elephant in the room." I've found out over

the years, that everyone sees the problem and when it is brought out in the open everyone is usually relieved that someone was brave enough to breech the issue, to "speak up."

Dare to Stand Strong (Lead) - It is said that leadership is getting people to go in the direction that they are supposed to go in and getting them to like it. Leadership along with integrity means standing strong for what you know is right, even when most everyone appears to be against it. I've found in most cases that they are not opposed to it, they are either misinformed or have the wrong information; that is why communication is paramount.

Dare to Trust (Serve) – Our whole system is based on trust. The major reason that we see our system breaking down is that we don't trust one another. I believe that the major reason we don't trust one another anymore is because we have lost our capability of serving one another. It is quite easy to isolate ourselves with the use of email and social media...it has been said that we are more connected and less attached than we have ever been. The basic way to trust one another again is to find ways to serve. The more we serve one another the more we will trust one another.

As we are going through this time of uncertainty let us rely on what we know, what we have accomplished in the past and how we have faced the challenges of our lives to move us forward. As we persevere we will come out of this better and stronger than we were before.

For over 50 years, thousands of 4-H youth between the ages of 14 and 19 have traveled to Washington, DC to participate in Citizenship Washington Focus (CWF), a life-changing week that empowers 4-Her's to take their leadership skills to the next level for themselves and their communities. 4-H

youth are empowered to make a positive impact in their communities, their country, and their world. For 2021, Missouri 4-H would like to take up to 50 youth to the National 4-H Conference Center in Chevy Chase, MD for an immersive leadership experience. Delegates will get to tour major landmarks in Washington, D.C., meet peers from across the country and develop their interpersonal leadership skills through event planning and execution. Missouri 4-H also adds a special extension to the trip to visit New York City's historic landmarks. During the 2021 CWF trip, delegates will have the unique opportunity to experience Independence Day in our nation's capital!

Cost to Attend: Approximately \$2500, made in 4 installments. This number is subject to change. Delegates will be responsible for raising their own funds, but delegation leaders will support the youth with ideas and some organized fundraising opportunities.

Missouri State Fair Cattle Barn Project

For the 2020 Missouri State Fair, the sand will be removed from the cattle barn stalls and will be replaced with mulch bedding. A bedding fee of \$10 per head will be implemented for beef cattle exhibitors only. This fee will be collected along with beef cattle entries. Dairy cattle, which show toward the end of the Fair, will still be allowed to bring in their own straw to place on top of the mulch bedding.

Missouri State Fair Swine DNA Cards

The deadline for Missouri State Fair exhibitor swine DNA cards to be postmarked has been *extended to June 15*. This extension is to assist exhibitors with meeting the requirements of the DNA cards.

Other important dates and deadlines for exhibitors will continued to be reviewed and modified if necessary as situations change. Information will be posted on the Fair's website, <u>mostatefair.com</u>, as it becomes available.

Due to the vast amount of changes in 4-H programming, we have complied a list of opportunities/events and any details we have regarding them.

Postponed events: Refunds may be requested now by emailing the person listed in the notes column and giving your name and event. Refunds will be processed weekly on Fridays. MU's refund policy states we will refund money in the way it was received—for instance, if you paid by credit card, your credit card will be credited back. We will re-open the events for registration once we have a set date. If it is found an event must be cancelled, everyone will be refunded automatically.

Clover Kids Corner



Through Clover Kids clubs, children learn how to get along, share, and work in groups, explore their interests, and build self-confidence. Each Clover Kids Corner provides an activity, information or other materials that Clover Kids leaders can use in planning and implementing experiences that introduce five to seven-year olds to the 4-H concept of learning by doing.

Plant a Garden

You don't need a huge patch of land to grow a garden. A small square of backyard or a flowerpot on a balcony or sunny windowsill will do just fine! With a little bit of care, you and your family can enjoy tomatoes or flowers that you grew together.

Supplies

- □ A seedling tomato, herb, or flower (look for these at supermarkets, garden centers, or farmers' markets)
- \Box A trowel
- \Box A flowerpot, window box, or sunny patch of backyard
- \Box Potting soil (if you are using a flowerpot or window box)
- \Box A watering can

Here's How Fill your flowerpot or window box about three-quarters full with potting soil. If you are planting in your backyard, select a site.

With your trowel, dig a hole deep and wide enough to hold the roots of your plant. Be sure your flowerpot will provide enough space for the roots to grow. Place the plant in the hole, then fill in the dirt around the roots. Pat the dirt down gently, but don't pack it down too tightly. Water your plant immediately after planting. A little water is best. If you are using a flowerpot or window box, place your plant in a sunny spot near a window. Water it every few days or if the soil is dry. When your tomatoes or herbs are ready for harvest, choose a recipe to make and share with your family.
