
Online Classes

As a Youth Leader you will:

- Work closely with 4-H Building Superintendents to plan and facilitate hands-on learning opportunities
- Learn more about the State Fair and planning programs
- Interact with fairgoers and 4-H'ers during the Missouri State Fair

MSF Scholarships

The Missouri State Fair and the Youth in Agriculture Committee are accepting applications for Youth in Agriculture scholarships for Missouri high school seniors graduating in 2021. The application form can be found on the Fair's <u>website</u>. Applications should be submitted to the Missouri State Fair and must be postmarked by February 1, 2021. Applicants must submit an original copy of their application and three additional copies. A total of 40 scholarships will be awarded. Applicants must be high school seniors and active members of Missouri 4-H or FFA and have participated at least once as a 4-H or FFA exhibitor at the Missouri State Fair. Selected students must enroll (fall and/or spring semester immediately following graduation from high school) in an accredited community college, college or university in the state of Missouri. Applicants are not required to pursue a degree in agriculture; however, a five-point bonus will be given to applicants pursuing a degree in agriculture during the selection process.

Contest & Event Dates

We are hopeful that in-person events will be possible but will continue to monitor and follow University guidelines as we approach the contest dates. If an in-person event is not possible, we will look to hosting a virtual alternative. As always, we will notify you of any changes as soon as possible.

Target Circle



State 4-H Executive Council Elections

Recently, the bylaws of the Missouri 4-H State Council have changed, and this effects how many members sit on the council and who can run for office. It is time to apply if you would like to run for an Executive Committee position.

What is State 4-H Council?

State 4-H Council is the representative body of all Missouri 4-H'ers at the state level and consists of 5 Executive Committee members and one Regional Representative from each of the 8 Regions. They assist with planning and implementing statewide 4-H programs, give input on 4-H program and policy issues and work to address the issues and concerns most important to Missouri 4-H youth. Examples of their leadership can be seen through their work with Teen Conference, State Congress, and the Kids Helping Kids Grant. They often volunteer at statewide 4-H events, as well as represent Missouri 4-H at the State Fair.

Who is eligible to apply?

All youth ages 14-18 (on 12/31/2020) who are enrolled in a Missouri 4-H program are invited to apply. No prior involvement with the State 4-H Council is required to run for an Executive Committee position.

What positions can youth apply for?

- <u>President</u>: serves as chairperson of the Exec. Committee and presides over meetings of the Mo State 4-H Council and some assemblies during State 4-H Congress. The President shall keep a transparent line of communication with Council members, executive committee, and adult advisors.
- <u>Vice President</u>: serves as Parliamentarian. In the absence of the President, they preside over meetings. They oversee all standing committees and oversees the review of the Council's governing documents.
- <u>Secretary</u>: keeps the minutes of every meeting of the Exec. Committee and State 4-H Council. The secretary is responsible for keeping attendance and ensuring that attendance policies are enforced.
- <u>Treasurer</u>: is responsible for the disbursement of Kids Helping Kids funds and oversees the 4-H'ers Helping 4-H'ers endowment. The Treasurer also serves as the Missouri 4-H Foundation Trustee.
- <u>Outreach Coordinator</u>: is responsible for overseeing and collaborating with the State 4-H Office on all official external communication channels of the State 4-H Council. This includes, but is not limited to, social media, email and print publications.

What about Regional Representatives?

Regional Representatives must apply via the separate application process. Regional Representatives are also part of the Council, but they are selected by their Region. More information about the Regional Representative application can be found <u>here.</u> Candidates for State 4-H Council Exec. positions are allowed to interview for a Regional Rep position. If selected for a Regional Rep position and a State 4-H Council Exec office, their Regional Representative position will go to the alternate that was selected by their Regional selection committee.

How to apply.

Applications are due January 1st, 2020.

Interested youth must submit an Executive Officer Application form, a resume, a letter of interest and a minimum of two letters of recommendation (one 4-H staff/faculty and one from a professional or personal reference of their choice) to Council Coordinator, Samantha Brandeberry via email (brandeberrys@missouri.edu) or postal mail (1110 S College Avenue Columbia, MO 65211).

Interviews will take place February 1st-4th for those candidates chosen by the professional panel. 10 candidates (two per office) will be announced and have the opportunity to campaign at State 4-H Congress and give speeches in front of their peers. All Missouri 4-H members 4-H ages 14-18 will vote to select their State 4-H Council Exec Committee. Installation of officers takes place on the final morning of State 4-H Congress.

Clover Kids Corner

Through Clover Kids clubs, children learn how to get along, share, and work in groups, explore their interests, and build self-confidence. Each Clover Kids Corner provides an activity, information or other materials that Clover Kids leaders can use in planning and implementing experiences that introduce five to seven-year olds to the 4-H concept of learning by doing.



Easy Soap Making

Materials:

- Glycerin soap in many colors (this only works with glycerin soap)
- Soap or candy molds
- Microwave
- Microwavable cups or paper cups
- Plastic or metal spoons and/or wooden sticks or coffee stirrers
- Knife

Instructions:

- Cover table or work area with newspaper
- Cut bars of soap into about three pieces each
- Put a piece into a cup (cut the piece in half if you plan to mix colors)
- Put soap in microwave and melt it on high for about 10-15 seconds (it may take longer on low-wattage microwaves. If it doesn't change to liquid in 15 seconds or it starts to bubble or boil, you may not have a pure glycerin soap bar)
- Remove it using a potholder, and stir to mix thoroughly
- Pour melted soap (work quickly, it hardens fast) into molds(to prevent sticking, oil the molds with cooking spray or oil)
- Wait about 5 minutes for it to harden and cool
- Remove from molds and continue the process
- Put soap in gift bags or bath bags to give as presents!
