Dear 4-H Families,

You might have guessed that with the name McNary some of my ancestry is Scottish. I have always admired the Scots for several things including their thriftiness, but the quality I most admire them for is their perseverance.

There is a story told about Robert the Bruce who was king of Scotland and how perseverance paid off. He lived in times that were wild and dangerous so he had to be both brave and wise. The major reason for the danger was that the King of England was at war with him, and had led a great army into Scotland to drive him out of the land and make Scotland a part of England.

Battle after battle he had fought with England. Six times Robert the Bruce had led his brave little army against his foes. Six times his men had been beaten and the army of Scotland was entirely scattered. The king was forced to hide in the woods and caves among the mountains.

One rainy day, Robert the Bruce lay in a cave, listening to the rainfall outside the cave entrance. He was so sick and tired of his predicament that he was ready to give up. It seemed that there was no use for him to try to do anything more. Then he noticed a spider over his head, getting ready to weave her web. He watched her as she worked slowly and with great care. Six times she tried to throw her thread from one edge of the cave wall to another. Six times her thread fell short. Robert the Bruce thought, "that poor spider she is just like me, tried and failed six times in a row". He thought for sure that the spider would give up, but the spider did not lose hope. With still more care, she tried a seventh time. Robert the Bruce almost forgot his own troubles as he watched, fascinated. She swung herself out upon the slender line. Would she fail again? No! The thread was carried safely to the cave wall, and fastened there.

That is when Robert the Bruce decided that he too would try a seventh time. He got up, called his men together and told them his plans. He sent them out with a hopeful message to enlist men to serve in his army against the English; shortly there was an army of brave men around him. A seventh battle was fought, and the King of England was forced to retreat. Soon, England recognized Scotland as an independent country with Robert the Bruce as its rightful king.

To this day, the victory and independence of Scotland is traced to a spider that kept trying again and again to spin her web in a cave and inspired the king of Scotland, Robert the Bruce.

In our own lives we need to persevere. As we learn new life skills in 4-H, we may have to try over and over to get things right. The encouragement of caring adults guides 4-H members to not give up on meetings, projects, even themselves. Through perseverance 4-H members can accomplish many things.

4-H Sportfishing Volunteer Certification Training

4-H Sportfishing Volunteer Certification Training is now available in 4-H Online. Volunteers must complete the certification to be sportfishing leaders. For those that completed the prior approval process, they will not need to take the new 4-H Online sportfishing certification.

Steps to for volunteers to complete certification:

- Order or borrow the National 4-H CCS Sportfishing Curriculum (Fishing Curriculum Set of 4). These can be found on <u>shop4-H.org</u>.
- Review the <u>MO 4-H State Sportfishing Plan</u>.
- Review curriculum <u>resources</u>.
- Complete the Sportfishing Leader Training and Quiz in <u>4-H Online</u>. Leaders **must** have a profile in 4-H Online and be approved 4-H volunteers.
 - They can access it in 4-H Online by logging into their profile, select "trainings" from the left side column, select "register", and then complete the "Sport Fishing Leader Training."
 - The quiz will be graded (80% is passing). If the volunteer does not pass, they may complete the training and quiz again.

4-H STEM Challenge Kits

The 4-H STEM Challenge is coming up soon! The official kick off will be in October!

Designed by Clemson University, the 2021 4-H STEM Challenge, Galactic Quest, focuses on the mysteries and adventures of space exploration. Galactic Quest explores the history of humans in space, the technology and resources

needed for missions, and the obstacles humans encounter in orbit. Activities explore important STEM topics ranging from physics and engineering to computer science and space agriculture.

This is a great opportunity to build your resume and will look great on your college applications. Teens ages 13-18 with experience in STEM projects are encouraged to apply. Applications will be **due by October 10**. Teens will serve in their roles from October 2021 – September 2022.

Missouri 4-H Hall of Fame inducts 44 members

"Making the best better" for generations of Missouri 4-H club members, 44 volunteers joined the Missouri 4-H Hall of Fame on Aug. 21 at State Fair Community College in Sedalia. The Missouri 4-H Foundation recognizes individuals who have created a legacy of service to 4-H by honoring them with membership in the Missouri 4-H Hall of Fame, said Rachel Augustine, director of the Missouri 4-H Foundation. "The 4-H program would not be possible without our dedicated volunteers," Augustine said. "They are the backbone of 4-H, supporting and nurturing thousands of young people every year. We are proud to recognize these dedicated people who have helped shape 4-H history."

Inductees from 35 counties established a legacy totaling 1,101 years of service to 4-H. Missouri 4-H friends and family members attended the 15th annual event, which was sponsored by FCS Financial and the Missouri State Fair in partnership with the Missouri 4-H Foundation. "We are eternally grateful to the more than 7,000 volunteers who provide mentorship and guidance to our youth, helping them become leaders and responsible adults," said Lupita Fabregas, director of the University of Missouri Extension 4-H Center for Youth Development. "Now, more than ever, we must celebrate and thank them for the years of service they have dedicated to educating young people," Fabregas added. "Year after year, our volunteers—like the ones we celebrate today—continue to demonstrate the true meaning of devotion, compassion and commitment, helping us build a better future for the next generation of Missourians."

"Stained Glass" Butterfly

Materials/Supplies:

Wax paper Crayon shavings - variety of colors Paper towels Iron Hole-punch String or yarn

Directions

Place wax paper butterfly shape on a flat surface. Put crayon shavings inside the butterfly shape (sparingly because too much makes it too hard to melt). Cover the wax paper with another piece of wax paper. Next, an adult irons the two layers of wax paper together on low heat (put a paper towel on top of the wax paper while ironing). Cut out the butterfly and punch a hole near the top. Put a string/yarn in the hole and hang it in a window.
