10 Fascinating Facts about February

- 1. February (do you see that extra "r"?) is one of the most frequently misspelled words in the English language. In 2015, even the White House press office got it wrong—several times over the course of the month.
- 2. For more than 40 years, February has been Black History Month. The precursor to Black History Month, however, is a lot older. Black leaders in 1926 dedicated the second week in February to the recognizing the history of African-Americans—a week chosen to coincide with the birthdays of Abraham Lincoln (Feb. 12) and Frederick Douglass (Feb. 14).
- 3. It's the month for a lot of causes. February marks Black History Month, American Heart Month, along with some other "months" you might not recognize: Canned Food Month, Grapefruit Month, Hot Breakfast Month, and our favorite, Return Shopping Carts to the Supermarket Month.
- 4. February got its start as a spring-cleaning festival. Well, kind of. It's named after one: "Februa" was an early Roman festival and cleansing ritual held on Feb. 15.
- 5. It's the only month that can pass without having a full moon. That doesn't mean February never has a full moon—it usually does, as a matter of fact. The last time it didn't was 1999. The next time it won't have a full moon? 2037!
- 6. Groundhog Day—Feb. 2—is based on a German superstition. In Germany, though, it's not a groundhog that forecasts either an early spring or a longer winter: It's a badger.
- 7. February is the only month that gets longer every four years. Sure, everybody knows about leap years, and most know why we have them. But did you know that every so often, we need a "leap second," too? This is typically added to Coordinated Universal Time in June or December, because of irregularities in our planet's rotation.
- 8. The odds of being born on Feb. 29 are about 1 in 1,461. If you're born on a leap day, you're typically known as a "leaper" or "leapling." And depending on where you live, Feb. 28 or March 1 is considered your birthday in non-leap years.
- 9. And maybe it's more commercial than romantic now, anyway. It's estimated that Americans spend more than \$18 billion on gifts, chocolate and more for Valentine's Day.
- 10. The first Sunday in February is Super Bowl Sunday (at least for the foreseeable future). It wasn't always that way—until 2001, the game was played in January. But we'd say that's a pretty good way to kick off a month.

State 4-H Congress Opportunity Scholarship Due to county staff by Feb 18

It is time to apply for Opportunity 4-H Scholarships for State 4-H Congress in 2022. Each scholarship is \$100 and the balance of \$100.00 is to be paid by the individual or local contributions. If you qualified and received the Level 2 Award, you are not eligible for this scholarship.

- Download and fill out <u>application</u>. It is a in a Google Drive folder so you **must download it** for it to be a fillable PDF.
- Mail or email the competed form to your county 4-H specialist for their signature. It must be in their hands by February 18. They sign and forward the application to the state office.
- County offices will receive the names of the recipients by February 28 and will contact the recipients.
- State Congress registration will open **March 1**. Scholarships are entered by the state office into 4-H Online so the delegate can accept the scholarship and the amount will automatically be deducted from their total as they register for the event.

The Missouri Junior Science and Humanities Symposium (JSHS) is a national STEM event to challenge and engage 9-12th grade students in

science, technology, engineering, or mathematics (STEM). This year's Missouri JSHS will be a two-day event on March 18-19, with day one in-person at the University of Missouri-Columbia and day two held virtually via Zoom. The in-person day will include campus experiences to give participants a better understanding of STEM opportunities beyond high school and prepare them for undergraduate pursuits. Participating high school students will be able to share their research projects and compete for scholarships. Finalist will be funded to participate in the National JSHS. There is also a regional teacher award to recognize educators advancing student participation in STEM research.

There are eight categories for student research:

- environmental sciences
- biomedical sciences
- life sciences
- medical and health/behavioral sciences

- engineering and technology
- mathematics and computer science
- physical sciences
- chemistry

4-H Feeding Missouri

Through a partnership and a generous donation from Missouri Farmers Care, matching mini grants are available. Proposals will be accepted from January 1 to March 31, for projects/events occurring between January 1 and April 30.

Guidelines - In order to be considered for a matching grant, proposals must:

- Be submitted no later than March 31 by an organized 4-H entity, such as a county 4-H council, 4-H club, county 4-H foundation or county MU Extension council acting on behalf of the 4-H group. County 4-H partnership proposals are acceptable.
- Involve 4-H members and adult volunteers and actively engage them in "learning by doing" through servicelearning.
- Projects and events must be youth-driven and related to the 4-H Feeding Missouri/Drive to Feed Kids Campaign.
- Demonstrate receipt of matching funds or in-kind contributions. Grant monies must have at least 100% matching funds. For example, \$100 grant request must show \$100 in matching funds or in-kind contributions such as labor (volunteer hours), materials, supplies, or donation.
- Project/Event must occur between January 1 and April 30.
- Include a plan to share your work with others (i.e., newspaper, social media, etc.). Describe how your group will recognize 4-H, MU Extension and Missouri Farmers Care.

Budget - This grant is a matching grant. This means your group is to provide the initial contribution totaling the amount you are requesting (no more than \$250). Your initial contribution can include funds collected from fundraisers, cash donations, food donations, in-kind (volunteer hours), costs to host event related to project, etc. Matching funds can also be used to further your 4-H Feeding Missouri donation by donating to a local food pantry or bank; or used to offset expenses group occurred from hosting fundraising events/efforts.

Through Clover Kids clubs, children learn how to get along, share, and work in groups, explore their interests, and build self-confidence. Each Clover Kids Corner provides an activity, information or other materials that Clover Kids leaders can use in planning and implementing experiences that introduce five- to seven-year-olds to the 4-H concept of learning by doing.



Valentine Cookie Pops

Ingredients for a group of 10 children:

- 20 vanilla wafer cookies
- ½ cup peanut butter (substitute frosting for children with peanut allergies)
- 1 six-ounce bag white chocolate chips
- 1 six-ounce bag semi-sweet chocolate chips
- Colored candy sprinkles, gummy bears (red, white and pink)
- Cake decorating writer gel (green, pink, red, black and white)
- Cake decorator frosting with flower tip (white, red, and pink)
- Red food coloring
- Ice cream or lollipop sticks
- Wax paper or paper plates

Instructions:

- 1. Spread peanut butter (or frosting) onto the flat side of the cookies.
- 2. Place an ice cream stick into the peanut butter on half the cookies.
- 3. Top with another cookie so the stick is sandwiched between the two cookies.
- 4. Melt the two bags of chocolate chips separately (i.e., white and semi sweet) and stir until smooth.
- 5. Separate the white chocolate in two bowls and add a few drops of red food coloring to make pink chocolate.
- 6. Dip cookie pops in the melted chocolate, covering completely.
- 7. Roll pops in red and white sprinkles and lay or stand on waxed paper or paper plate.
- 8. Place in refrigerator to chill.

Variations:

Writing - Write fun Valentine shorts on plain pops such as "love" and add a gummy bear

Hearts – Use the decorator gel to draw on hearts and hearts with arrows

Flowers – Using the flower tip, pipe on colorful flowers with icing. Use the green gel to add steams and leaves.
