Dear county commissioners and friends of MU Extension and Engagement,

Thank you for your important partnership with the University of Missouri Extension this past year.

I want to highlight three areas that address needs you helped us identify.

You may recall that the FY 23 state budget provided a one-time \$5 million infusion to MU Extension for growth. Of that, we allocated about \$3 million for field faculty in the areas of agriculture, 4-H, health/human development and business and community development.

Through a dedicated hiring effort, and thanks to that allocation, we have hired 168 new employees since November 2022. That includes 72 academic/faculty members, most of whom are field specialists in a priority area noted above, and 96 staff members (e.g., office administrators, youth and food and nutrition associates, etc.).

We also returned more faculty to local program delivery that best serves your county's needs, while preserving the partnership and relationship building work you value. Our extension and engagement specialists focus full-time on that work as they serve their assigned multi-county groups. Currently, 19 have been hired, with two more in the pipeline.

Finally, we are prioritizing our work with county extension councils. In the new role of partnership and council development director, Lorin Fahrmeier focuses on strengthening council representation and governance. This role will build stronger links with regional, educational and campus leadership to better identify and address local priorities.

At the UM System level, our engagement work across four universities and with leaders across the state makes a difference in areas of greatest need: broadband, workforce development, health access, food security and healthy futures for our youth.

Your county annual report shows what we are accomplishing together as we Serve Missouri and Deliver Mizzou. We look forward to strengthening that partnership with county commissioners and community stakeholders in the coming year.

Extension funding is a three-way federal, state, and county government partnership. Federal and state money through the University of Missouri system pays professional staff salaries, training costs, computers, and communication equipment. County funds support the local office, secretarial and youth assistant salaries, staff mileage, and council expenses.

Economic and Community Development Highlights

 In 2022, Business Development Specialists worked with small businesses and entrepreneurs statewide to create or retain 81,645 jobs.



For every dollar invested from 2019 to 2021, the MU Extension Business Development Program has returned \$133 in economic impact for its clients by increasing sales more than \$1.6 billion. For a total impact of \$3.1 billion, the program has generated more than 37,000 jobs and attracted nearly \$451 million in capital investments and \$1.5 billion in government contracts.

 Between FY17 and FY22, UM System brought Missouri more than \$1.46 billion in federal and private research funds, funded primarily from outside the state, but spent within the state.



In FY23, UM System was issued 33 patents and filed 61 new U.S. patent applications.

 In FY23, the UM System awarded 805 design and construction project contracts throughout Missouri, for a total investment of \$279.2 million in the state.



In FY23, to improve access to medical and health related services, MU Health Care's Missouri Telehealth Network's Show-Me ECHO program provided 18,381 hrs of case-based instruction to 2,938 learners located in 112 of 114 Missouri counties and the city of St. Louis.

Pesticide Applicator Training sessions were hosted in both Dunklin and Pemiscot Counties this year. The curriculum used is a PowerPoint that has been approved by the Missouri Department of Agriculture's Bureau of Pesticide Control. Five programs were offered at SEMO Kennett. Mike worked closely with chemical dealers in both Dunklin and Pemiscot Counties. There were 103 trained in Dunklin and 35 in Pemiscot County.

Mike is the Community Representative for Missouri on the United Migrant Opportunity Services (UMOS) Migrant and Seasonal Head Start (MSHS) Policy Council. He is also member of the UMOS Board of Directors. UMOS meetings are held quarterly but have been virtual this past year and a half due to COVID-19. Monthly Policy Council meetings are attended. The Policy Council works very closely with the Missouri/Arkansas MSHS Director Rachel Overbey. He was able to participate in the annual self-assessment at the Cardwell Center this year. The strengths include two long-term bus drivers and their experience. Their major concern is that they must travel a great distance to pick up eligible students. They have to set up what is known as a Safe Stop. This is a location where students can use the restroom and have a chance to get off the busses for a fifteen-minute break. The staff are well trained and there were no issues found at the center.

In 2023, Dr. Maude Harris provided programming in Scott county and throughout the region. Maude had **1,748** direct programming contacts and over **15,442** indirect contacts for programs and engagement. Dr. Harris was coinstructor for two Tai **Chi** classes, two **Matter of Balance** classes, one **Stay**, **Strong**, **Stay Healthy** class, six **Keep Your Keys** classes, ten **Food Preservation** classes, two **Dining with Diabetes** classes, and two **Diabetes Self-Management** classes. Dr. Harris also coordinated other programming to be brought into the area. Dr. Harris serves on several boards and committees. She is currently co investigator for Type 2 African American Diabetic adults and Stress in the Missouri Bootheel Counties



Missouri 4-H Agriculture and STEM programs

employ hands-on activities that foster problemsolving, creativity, critical thinking and exploration in engineering and technology. Agriculture programming emphasizes biology, environmental science, agri-science, veterinary science and engaging activities such as animal care and agronomy. STEM programs delve into computer science, robotics, aerospace, physics, chemistry and veterinary science.

Engagement Work:

- I started my journey with MU Extension in May 2023. In July, I took part in Camp Soar in Mississippi County, teaching life skills to students in grades 3-8. We also covered the importance of avoiding drugs.
- In August I participated in the Family Fun Fest with Parent Link and the Family Resource Center in New Madrid and interacted with the community with the Blender Bikes to promote healthy snacks and exercise.
- In August, I began a non-credit course called MO-RE Implementation, focusing on gathering data for a comprehensive Needs Assessment across six counties. This assessment looks into infectious diseases, chronic diseases, and cancer to improve skills and set consistent standards in the region.
- Come September, I got involved in the Scalable Mental Health Pilot Program for New Madrid County. It's a telehealth initiative where UM System Universities provide mental health services through extension offices.
- Field Specialist within MU Extension are also partnering with the Missouri Telehealth Network on promoting programs like Show Me Echo's, and connecting healthcare professionals and communities to share knowledge and resources.
- In November I assisted with the Women's Conference in Scott County and engaged in an energetic day of partnership learning and fellowship with women in the community. Key Outcomes:
- I've actively collaborated with community partners through Regional Resource Meetings in Kennett. Additionally, I attended key events like the Diabetes Shared Learning Network meeting in Jefferson City and Extension and Engagement Week in October, gaining valuable insights.
- I also participated in discussions at the Youth Vaping Conversations Meeting in Poplar Bluff and the Rural Health Research Conference in Columbia, focusing on effective engagement and information gathering. I attended the Rural Health Research Summit in Columbia, engaging in conversations about improving services in rural areas and overcoming related barriers.
- On the professional development front, I've completed the Brain and the Disease of Addiction Trainer Program and the Layperson Naloxone Administration Trainer Program. Currently, I'm in training to become a facilitator for the We Can Prosper Resilience Trainer Program and to conduct Recovery Friendly Workplace training. I look forward to offering these trainings in partnership with communities in the coming year.

The youth learned about building sturdy structures and much more! Mr. Rickman also participated in SEMO Health Network Community Days and worked to build connections in the communities in which he served while transitioning to his new role.

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UM System's MOREnet (Missour) Research and Education Network) provides internet connectivity, access, support and training to 58 higher education institutions (230,000 students), 485 K-12 school districts (832,000 students) and 132 public libraries (serving nearly 3 million Missourians) in 2022.

- UM System awarded 50.5% of the 32,098 Bachelor's or higher. degrees awarded by Missouri four-year public institutions in 2022-23.
- LIM System awarded 36.6% of the 1,939 research doctorates and 26.9% of the 3.593 professional doctorates awarded by Missouri public and not-for-profit private institutions in 2022-23.
- In FY23, UM System's \$37.9 million in National Science Foundation. (NSF) grants represented 88.3% of all NSF grants made to Missouri public colleges and universities
- In 2023, over 10,900 Missourions accessed mobroadband.org, part of the UM System Broadband initiative which helped the statewide build-out of high-speed internet infrastructure. MU Extension also supported residents in making individual challenges to the FCC. that resulted in \$810,000 in additional funding for the state of Missouri.
