All exhibits must remain in the building until 4:00 p.m., Sunday, June 13. Premiums will be forfeited for any exhibit removed early. Items that can be carried out by one person may be removed between 4-6 p.m. on Sunday. **Members and parents will need a fair pass to pick up exhibits on Sunday.** Exhibits can also be picked up on Monday between noon and 2:00 p.m., or from 4:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. All exhibits must be checked out by 4-H officials.



New Registration Process for Exhibitors

The 2021 Franklin County Fair will utilize a new enrollment system called FairEntry. Any youth participants exhibiting at the fair must use the system to register. There will be no paper registration forms.

Login In

Payment

Fees associated with livestock shows will be paid through FairEntry. The system will tally a participant's total fee as they register for livestock classes. These fees can be paid at the end of your FairEntry registration process or by check to the Franklin County Extension office for the total amount. Exhibitor fees must be received by May 28, 2021 or the exhibitor will not be allowed to show. Make checks payable to Franklin County Extension. Address: 116 West Main Street, Union, MO 63084.

Exhibitor passes may also be bought through FairEntry during the registration period for \$15. Passes will be mailed to families who buy online. Tickets can still be purchased at the Franklin County Extension Office until 4 p.m. June 9th.

GENERAL RULES FOR EXHIBITORS

1. 4-H Building Entries will be accepted from 2:30 - 6:30 p.m., Wednesday, June 9. See the schedule of events for details.
2. FFA Farm Mechanics exhibits accepted from 8:00 a.m. to noon on Thursday, June 10.
3. Each exhibit shall be owned or made by the exhibitor and shall represent work accomplished in a 4-H or FFA project being carried in the 2020-2021 project/school year.
4. All judging will be done on the basis of the Danish system which includes blue, red and white groups.
5. Prize money will be awarded to exhibitors. Blue, red and white ribbon winners will receive the points indicated in the premium list. Premium value will be determined by the Franklin County Fair Board. **All 4-H and FFA fair premiums must be picked up at the fair** (see premium payout schedule). If you will not be able to pick your premiums up at the fair, you must arrange for someone to pick them up for you. No premiums will be paid out after the fair.

6. In all classes the decisions of the judge will be final.
7. **FOR 4-H BUILDING EXHIBITS:** Each exhibitor will be limited to a maximum of 10 items per project except for photography. Photography project exhibitors are limited to 5 exhibits. You may enter more than two per class, as long as they are not duplicates. Color change does not qualify exhibit as being different. Construction of the item must be done to induce a change. Notebooks, posters and file card systems will be accepted. Educational displays must include three-dimensional items. Conference Judging is limited to four exhibits, **but only one exhibit per project**.
8. **All exhibits must be pre-registered.** All registrations must be completed in FairEntry between May 10-19. No late registrations will be accepted. Register at: <http://franklincounty.fairentry.com/>

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS FOR BUILDING EXHIBITS

Where the exhibit list states, "any item made," members may display any item made in that project. This includes notebooks, file cards, photo displays, posters, or educational displays. Regardless of project, the following dimensions must be used:

- Poster - No larger than 14" x 22"; flat only; do not fasten three-dimensional items to the poster.
- **Any Photo display (These requirements must be followed for a photo exhibit in any project.) - PHOTOGRAPHY REQUIREMENTS:**
 1. Photos must be mounted on a rectangular 8"x10" solid mounting surface.
 2. The preferred surface is matte board. It can be the color of the photographer's choice.
 3. The photographs mounted on each 8"x10" matte board must be 8"x10" or smaller.
 4. The mounted photo should be placed in a clear plastic 8 ¼ x 10 ½ inch sleeve. PLEASE NOTE: Solid requires that there are no cutouts (or other holes) in the matte board, either around or behind the photo (for example, a surface shaped like a picture frame is not a solid mounting surface). Sleeves are intended to protect these special exhibits from handling, dust and humidity DIGITAL EDITING RULES For State Fair 4-H photography exhibits, certain types of editing are permissible and others are not. 1) 1. Altering (editing to change the contents of) a photo is not permitted for State Fair exhibits. • Examples include adding a sunset or object, removing someone from the shot, airbrushing to cover a bad complexion, giving a photo subject dinosaur eyes, etc. 2) Enhancing (editing to improve the existing qualities of) a photo is permitted. • Examples include cropping the photo, eliminating redden and changing levels of saturation, brightness, contrast, etc.
- **Educational display** - Must not exceed 18 inches in height, 16 inches in depth (front to back) and 12 inches in width. Must include three-dimensional items and stand alone. (Posters with items taped to them do not qualify as an educational display. Science fair display boards are too large.)
- **Entomology or Geology display boxes** - Box must be 18" long x 24" wide and 3½" deep. Plexiglas or plastic covers are preferred. No handles or knobs.
- **Working models** – These exhibits should show how things work (cut away sections of motors or computers for example) or can be used to help identify parts such as parts of a motor or computer. Items such as model wildlife plots, cut-away engines, or other similar displays should require floor space no larger than 14" x 22".
- **Decorated Cakes** – The use of forms or pans is recommended. Cakes should not exceed 13 inches in height or at

the base. Cake boards should not exceed a 1 inch margin on each side of cake pan or form and the margin is considered part of the 13 inch base limit. Use Royal Icing, Rolled Fondant or commercial product (i.e. Dapp) that will harden and preserve the decoration on the cake pan or form. Adding Tylose powder to fondant will help it hold its shape in humidity. No real cakes, butter cr me icing or tube/gel icing.

- **Scrapbooking** – Exhibits should be only 1 page, 1 side representative of the complete scrapbook. Size not to exceed 12 inches by 12 inches. All pages should be in a clear protective sleeve or clear zipper bag. Do not frame.

CONFERENCE JUDGING

Conference judging is a process where the judge interviews the member about their exhibit. Members can have up to four exhibits conference judged, but only one exhibit in a project area. That means that a member cannot have two craft items conference judged, even if the items are in different classes. The judge will award the ribbon for the item based on a combination of the interview and the quality of the exhibit. Items can be conference judged from 3:00 - 4:00 p.m., and from 5:00 - 6:30 p.m.

FOODS/ NUTRITION /PRESERVATION

1. **All food items must include recipe card.** Food must be of reasonable quality to keep more than a week. Do not send food items which will spoil quickly such as casseroles, pizza, cream or fruit pies, items made with cream cheese, etc.
2. Submit food items on paper or disposable plates. Plastic wrap will be removed so drying of the food will extend display life of the product, and food items will be removed from plates and displayed as part of a bakery display. Food items will be displayed with their tags.. Please do not send expensive or keepsake containers!
3. Biscuits, cookies, muffins and other small items should be four per plate. Non/Undecorated cakes should be displayed in mini-versions (portions of 1/3 to 1/4 of a larger total product.)

FOOD PRESERVATION -

EXAMPLES: Canned, dried, or pickled foods (no cured hams), gift basket of preserved foods, educational displays, etc.

For safety reasons, all Food Arts exhibits must follow these rules:

1. All canned goods must be in standard canning jars, sealed with two-piece lids, and less than one year old. Bands should be in place for transporting jars but will be removed for judging.
2. Entries must be labeled with product name, date of preparation, processing method, length of processing time and recipe source. Example of a qualified label:
3. All foods must be canned according to 2015 or later USDA, or Ball guidelines. Information on standard procedure is available from the University of Missouri Extension Center.
4. Any sign of spoilage or alteration from standard processing guidelines will be basis for disqualification of the exhibit.
5. No food should be sampled by judges.

GENERAL RULES FOR LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS

1. **All exhibits must be pre-registered.** All registrations must be completed in FairEntry from May 10-19. No late registrations will be accepted.
2. Animals must be in place by the designated time on the day of the show. They will be released on the evening of the show, with the exact time to be determined by the 4-H Youth Specialist, and announced the evening of the show.

Stall area must be cleaned before animals are removed from the fair grounds. **Premiums will be forfeited if exhibits are removed before the time listed, or if stall area is not cleaned, unless written permission is obtained from Tanner Adkins.**
3. Read health requirements.
4. The Franklin County Fair Livestock shows are open to anyone age 8-18 by December 31, 2020 who is a member in good standing of a Franklin County 4-H Club, and who is enrolled in a livestock project of the species exhibited; or who is a member of a Franklin County FFA chapter who is not older than 18 on December 31, 2020. The show is also open to some 4-H and FFA members in surrounding counties. See rule 12 for more information.
5. Animals exhibited must be owned and shown by the exhibitor. If an exhibitor has more than one exhibit in a class, the exhibitor may recruit another youth exhibitor to show one of the animals.
6. Exhibitors' vehicles must be off the grounds by 11:30 a.m.
7. Bedding for livestock must be provided by exhibitor.
8. Judging will be based on the Danish System; all exhibits will receive a blue, red, or white ribbon. Prize money will be awarded based on the ribbon received. See class list for the points awarded to each class. Dollar value of points will be determined by the Franklin County Fair Board. **All 4-H and FFA fair premiums must be picked up at the fair** (see premium payout schedule). If you will not be able to pick your premiums up at the fair, you must arrange for someone to pick them up for you. No premiums will be paid out after the fair.
9. Livestock exhibitors must use Fair Entry to register their animals.
10. Exhibitors will be limited to two entries per single animal class and one entry per group class.
11. A stall fee of \$5.00 **per animal** for beef and dairy, \$3.00 **per animal** for sheep, swine, and goats, and \$1.00 **per entry** for rabbits and poultry, must accompany advanced registration. Doe and litter, and pen classes will be considered as one entry.
12. 4-H and FFA members outside of Franklin County must contact the Franklin County University of Missouri Extension Center, (636) 583-5141, to verify eligibility to show. **Out of county exhibitors are limited to \$100 in premiums.**
13. No trophy will be given unless there are two or more animals within a breed.
14. Showmanship: Trophies will be awarded in age divisions for Dairy, Beef, Swine, Sheep, Goat, Poultry, and Rabbits as listed below. Contestants must exhibit animals they own. **Must be 2 exhibitors before trophy is awarded.**

Beef, Poultry, and Rabbits will have 3 divisions:
 - a. Junior Showmanship – Contestants 8-10 years of age as of December 31, 2020.
 - b. Intermediate Showmanship – Contestants 11-14 years of age as of December 31, 2020.
 - c. Senior Showmanship – Contestants 15-18 years of age as of December 31, 2020.
Dairy, Swine, Sheep and Goat will have 2 divisions:
 - a. Junior Showmanship – Contestants 8-12 years of age as of December 31, 2020

ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITION - 2021

HEALTH CERTIFICATES/General Requirements:

- A. **All animals must have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection unless specifically exempted.** The Certificate of Veterinary Inspection must show required tests, vaccinations, etc., and individual identification and description of animals. Health certificates are valid for thirty (30) days
- B. Animals with ringworm lesions, easily visible warts, or other contagious diseases or conditions, will not exhibit and will have to be removed from community holding areas and stalls.
- C. The following listed entry requirements on livestock are for exhibition only. These minimal health and testing requirements do not qualify livestock that are to be sold or moved to a new owner or destination. Please investigate and comply with the added requirements for livestock that are to be in a sale as well as an exhibition.

EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS FOR CATTLE IN THE STATE OF MISSOURI

Intrastate (cattle in Missouri moving for exhibition only in Missouri)

- A. No Certificate of Veterinary Inspection required).
- B. Brucellosis – no test or vaccination is required.
- C. Tuberculosis - no test is required.

EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS FOR SWINE IN MISSOURI

Intrastate (swine in Missouri moving for exhibition only in Missouri)

- A. No Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is required.
- B. Brucellosis: No test is required.
- C. Pseudorabies: No test is required.

Intrastate (swine in Missouri moving for exhibition only in Missouri)

- A. Sheep that are to be exhibited must be free of clinical signs of an infectious or contagious disease. All animals must have a health certificate.
- B. All sheep, regardless of age or gender, must be individually identified by an official scrapie ear tag and be listed on a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
- C. No test required.

EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS FOR GOATS

Intrastate (Goats in Missouri being exhibited in Missouri)

- A. All goats that are to be exhibited must be free of clinical signs of an infectious or contagious disease.
- B. All goats, regardless of age or gender, must be individually identified by an official scrapie ear tag or any other means of permanent identification approved by the state veterinarian and be listed on a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
- C. No test required.

EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS FOR POULTRY:

Intrastate (poultry and waterfowl in Missouri being exhibited in Missouri)

- A. Poultry must be free of clinical signs of any infectious or contagious disease.
- B. No Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is required.
- C. All poultry (except water fowl) shall be tested negative for pullorum-typhoid within ninety (90) days prior to exhibition or an equivalent program in which the flock has been tested within the past 12 months with no change of ownership. This information shall be documented on a VS Form 9-2 or similar certificate which shall accompany the poultry to the exhibition and shall be made available on request. **Animals must be tested before arriving for the show.**

ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS FOR POULTRY AND RABBITS

- A. All rabbits and birds must be totally free of disease or parasites. All animals will be inspected when brought to the show table. Animals exhibiting parasites or disease will be disqualified from the show.
 1. Animals will be checked for visible signs of parasites and disease at the show table. Animals exhibiting visible signs of parasites or disease will be disqualified from the show and will not receive a ribbon.

The 4-H Archery tournament will be held at the east edge of the fair grounds on Sunday, June 14. Shooting begins at 11:00 a.m. You must check in at least 15 minutes before your scheduled shooting time. Archers must pre-register by May 19th using FairEntry. Only those who pre-register will be allowed to participate. Youth Class is open to 4-H members age 8-10, Junior Class is open to 4-H'ers age 11-13, Senior Class is open to 4-H members age 14 and older. **Ages are based on the members' age on December 31, 2020.** Members must be enrolled in a 4-H Shooting Sports Archery project under the supervision of a Certified 4-H Shooting Sports Archery leader.

Members participating in the shoot can purchase an Exhibitor Pass for \$15.00 from FairEntry or from the University of Missouri Extension Office. Exhibitor passes must be purchased by 4:00 p.m. on June 9. **All parents and other spectators will have to pay the daily fee to get into the fairgrounds unless they have a season pass.**

Youth (age 8-10) will shoot at 10 yards.
Juniors (age 11-13) will shoot at 15 yards.
Seniors (age 14 and older) will shoot at 20 yards.

Participants will shoot 60 arrows. Scoring will be 5-4-3-2-1, or five possible points per arrow.

String peeps and optical sights are permitted except in Traditional Recurve and Compound No Sights. Sights that project an image onto the target are not allowed. The Compound No Sights class is not available at the State 4-H Shooting Sports contest.
