#### Kelsa Fergusion: Impact Through Nutrition and Health Education

Nutrition and Health Field Specialist Kelsa Ferguson has been partnering with many organizations and groups in Greene County to teach classes over the past several months. These partnerships continue to grow and lead to reaching more audiences.

In the past year nutrition and health named Extension programs in Greene County that have been taught included Cooking Matters, Grocery Store Tours, Food Preservation, Matter of Balance, Taking Care of You, Chronic Disease Self-Management, Diabetes Self-Management, Childcare trainings, and Stay Strong, Stay Healthy. Along with that many other one time workshops have been taught at the request of different partnering organizations.

One of the most successful partnerships has been with Victory Mission Single Momz Rock group where in the past year we have taught three Cooking Matters for adult's series classes in partnership with Central Assembly of God who has let us use a space to host the classes. Surveys from these classes show that participants learn new ways to use different foods, to eat healthier, and save money from attending the six week class. The Single Momz Rock group has also taken part in Stress Management classes and Grocery store Tours. Classes with this group continue to be scheduled into the future.

Another successful partnership was work with the Elevate afterschool program in Republic. In the first semester that program started the 4H program "Health Rocks" was offered and taught teens about drug and alcohol dangers and also included a piece on cooking basics. In the second semester the "Grow it and Build it Pizza Club" was offered. Nutrition and Health partnered with horticulture specialist Kelly McGowan to teach the participants about how to grow the ingredients in the pizza while Kelsa Ferguson taught how to assemble and bake. Students got the opportunity to do hands on activities with plants and cooking.

Nutrition and Health has also partnered with many local senior centers to set up classes including Stay Strong, Stay Healthy and Matter of Balance. Northview Center had two Matter of Balance classes taught and had guest speakers from Mercy and Cox come in and teach the older adults about fall prevention safety. Participants in these classes learn about way to prevent falls and participate in exercises specifically for fall prevention in older adults.

# Outdoor Play has Benefits for Children Says Local Specialist

The weather is getting warmer and families are spending more time outdoors. This gives families more opportunities to use

outdoor play as teachable moments. Playing is part of learning and advancing a child's development. When children play outside they are able to learn by exploring the world around them. Below is a list of a few benefits associated with outdoor play.

#### Children learn science

• Science lessons are all around children when they are outdoors. Children can bring you discoveries they find through a nature scavenger hunt to start a conversation. A dandelion picked can open a conversation of questions. For example, "Why do you think dandelions turn white?

#### Children can choose and build confidence

• There are many less structured ways to interact with the outdoors than most indoor activities. Letting your child choose how they interact with the outdoors helps them build confidence.

#### Creativity and imagination

• Unstructured style play allows children to think more freely, create their own style of play, and try new ways to approach nature in imaginative ways.

Playing outside can lead to better physical and mental health, improved sleep, cognitive, social, and emotional skills for young children.

# Outdoors provide a new environment for learning

• Activities can be created outside differently than inside. Think of creative and engaging activities that fit your child's need to move and fit their interest. For example, if your child loves art you can collected different sticks and leaves and use them as natural paintbrushes with finger paint.

#### **Physical activity**

 Outdoor play builds a variety of gross motor skills including running, climbing, and jumping.

#### Books can come to life outside

• For example, a butterfly in the yard can create the questions and conversation with children such as "I wonder what that butterfly is looking for in the flower? Does she look like the butterfly we read about earlier?" Children develop knowledge about their world when

they have a chance to watch, observe, predict, and learn in the moment. Playing outdoors has benefits for both children and their family members. It is a point in the day to pause, look, listen, explore, observe, and move. Playing outside can lead to better physical and mental health, improved sleep, cognitive, social, and emotional skills for young children. Making sure outdoor play is a part of a child's daily schedule supports early learning and opens a world of curiosity.

# Necessary Changes Expand Leadership Program Beyond Ash Grove, Republic and Greene County

The start of Ash Grove and Republic Leadership classes were delayed due to COVID19. Classes will now have a start date of August. 24.

"A group of specialists from across the state have worked to create an online leadership class. There will be a variety of teachers providing live instruction," said David Burton, county engagement specialist, Greene County.

This approach has some advantages:
 We can include local components

- (kick-off and graduation) but have the quality of expert instructors.
- 2) Will make it possible to offer this in more communities with appropriate local sponsors and partners.
- We can further localize the training by offering Zoom meetings with local leaders. This is more convenient for guest speakers.
- The 2020 online class will include a certification and perhaps CEU credits for those that complete it.
- 5) The class will include the planning of a neighborhood/community project on paper. The idea is to create something a participant can implement or a document they can use to write a grant or sponsorships for future implementation.

"We are also working on an annual conference or event that will be open to graduates of our leadership programs and will feature high-quality instruction," said Burton.

# Work Underway on Community Garden in Ash Grove; MU Extension Hosts Interested Individuals

Volunteers in Ash Grove are continuing to work with University of Missouri Extension specialists and city officials on the development of a secure community garden. A planning meeting was held online via Zoom on Friday, May 1 to kick-start the effort and to hear from experts on the topic.

The garden – located on the west side of town inside a fenced area around the city water well – got its start as an idea among members of the 2019 Leadership Ash Grove class.

Kelly McGowan, a horticulture specialist with MU Extension, said her number one piece of advice for a successful community garden is finding a committed local project leader.

"You need a good strong leader that will be their day to day, organizing volunteers, leading workdays, and planning for garden upkeep," said McGowan. "It takes time and hard work but it can also give you purpose and keep you young."

McGowan has worked with several successful community gardens in the Springfield area as well as a few that eventually failed.

Bill McKelvey, an MU Extension associate and author of the community garden toolkit, said it is also important to define the purpose of the community garden.

"Most successful gardens serve multiple needs," said McKelvey. "Some people are in it to garden. Their motivation is to grow some food for themselves and their families. Other folks are more community-minded and so they may be interested in growing food for donation. Some may be more interested in social events and things that community gardens can facilitate."

At this point, the project in Ash Grove appears to be a combination of garden space for rent and garden space to raise produce for the food pantry, senior center and nursing home. Startup costs are going to require some initial sponsors and donations.

"Growing the garden in phases is a good plan. Start small, get some experience, and then expand as interest and volunteer numbers grow," said McKelvey.

#### **GARDEN BENEFITS**

Community gardening has the potential to offer a range of benefits to individuals, communities and the environment. Benefits include, but are not limited to, the following.

Food production — community gardens enable people to grow produce for themselves and their communities.

Nutrition — research indicates community gardeners eat more fruits and vegetables than nongardening families.

Exercise — gardening requires physical activity and helps improve the overall physical health of gardeners.

Mental health — interacting with plants and nature helps reduce stress and increases a gardeners' sense of wellness and belonging.

Community — community gardens foster a sense of community identity and stewardship among gardeners.

Learning — people of all ages can acquire and share skills and knowledge related to gardening, cooking, nutrition, health, culture, etc.

Youth — community gardens provide a place for youth to explore gardening, nature and community.

Property values — some research indicates that property values around community gardens increase faster than property values in similar areas without gardens.


**Online Private Applicator Training Efforts** – Due

#### MINUTES OF THE UNIVERSITY EXTENSION COUNCIL OF GREENE COUNTY

Date: Monday, April 27, 2020 Place: Via Zoom Meeting Attendees: Larry Adams, Tony Ahart, Morgan Ash, Lisa Bakerink, Greg Boehne, Chad Courtney, Karen Dowdy, Alex Greiwe, Tyler Gunlock, Missey Hayward, Joseph Hoffman, Ray Meyer, Chris Schultz, Rick Stenberg, Sam Snyder, Eric Sutton and Jason Whitesell.

The meeting was called to order at 12:01 pm, by Council Chair, Greg Boehne, who welcomed those in attendance, and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited. Secretary Morgan Ash called roll and it was determined that a quorum was present. **Consent Agenda: A motion was made by Joseph Hoffman and was seconded by Rick Stenberg, to approve the Consent Agenda including the March meeting minutes, and March Treasurer's report and bills to be paid for the month. Motion to approve passed by unanimous vote.** 

Staff Reports: Maggie Black is working on spreadsheets, training online, doing research, returning messages and is going to the office for a few days per week. Kelley McGowan has had a lot of success with a statewide horticulture town hall per week for outreach, with 80-100 people in attendance. Amber Allen and Kelsa Ferguson have had success with the Taking Care of You class this morning and afternoon. Both sessions are full. There was also a class last night at the Boys and Girls Club with 23 attendees. David Burton referred everyone to the Reaching Out Report for the month. Amy Patillo has been brokering relationships to attain ACT workforce achievement certification in the state. There have been webinars and canvassing with Dot Mailer to interested parties and to help eliminate spam. She is compiling resources on Covid-19 and integrating Zoom to the workforce rally page. This has a attracted statewide and is a good opportunity for a revenue stream.

**Council Youth Representative Report:** None. Ms. Waterman has aged out from 4-H and a new representative is being sought.

**Unfinished Business/Committee Reports**: <u>Gift Fund Expenditures</u>: Spending has been stalled and specialists are working on getting the very best deals.

<u>Resource Development Plan:</u> A better way to get involved with potential donors rather than using annual mailers is needed. Ways to grow the endowment for long-term sustainability need to be explored.

#### **New Business:**

<u>Elections and Nominations Committee:</u> Some MU alumni have been identified as potential election candidates for council.

<u>Budget and Audit Committee:</u> The matter of the copier and lease purchase has been referred to the agenda for council consideration. The money budgeted for the year has been received, but 2021 is anticipated to be a rough budget year.

<u>Personnel Committee:</u> There is a report in the packet. A date is being explored for a regular, quarterly, checkin with Maggie Black.

<u>Copier:</u> There is a proposal to purchase a copier instead of leasing one for significant savings of \$2000 for life of unit. There is a black and white printer, which is faster than the current one. There is a campus gift fund with approximately \$20,000.00 that can be used for the purchase. The current lease expires this month. Lakeland Finance Company has extended an offer for \$120 per month, for 60 months or \$5,295 to purchase. There is a \$40 per month service agreement, including toner, parts and service (not paper or staples), up to 5000 images per month with \$.008 per image overage.

A motion was made by Joseph Hoffman and was seconded by Rick Stenberg, to approve the Lakeland Finance Company purchase of a printer/copier per the bid, with funds from the campus gift fund. Motion to approve passed by unanimous vote.

<u>Century Farms Event and Ag Tour</u>: There have not been any applications from farms so far. The University has advised to keep gatherings to 10 attendees or less. The committee voted to focus on 2021 event and not to have the 2020 Century Farms event. The Agricultural Tour is moving forward, but will be a smaller event. The tour will be reevaluated in a few months.

<u>Annual Meeting</u>: The committee is working on a speaker and entertainment.

<u>Food Finder:</u> There is a new resource from the University that encourages local expenditure on locally produced food. It maps people who are selling food products from the local farms.

Joseph Hoffman moved to adjourn the meeting at 1:01 pm and Tyler Gunlock seconded the motion. The idea passed unanimously.




#### Labor and Workforce Development Report May 2020




