Clover Kids

Bubble Snakes

Bottle
Scissors
Elastic band
Flannel, face cloth or an old sock
Bubble mixture and water
Food colouring (optional)

Soap Bubbles Ingredients 6 cups Water 1 cup Dish Soap 1 Tablespoon Glycerin



Find a clean, empty plastic bottle. Using a pair of scissors or a craft knife (and adult supervision), help your child by cutting the bottom off the plastic bottle.

With your kids, cover the open end of your bottle with a piece of fabric that is similar to a washcloth or cotton sock. We used a flannel and cut it into a circle shape (to keep the ends from dipping into your bubble mixture

Measure 6 cups of water into one container, then pour 1 cup of dish **soap** into the water and slowly stir it until the **soap** is mixed in. Try not to let foam or **bubbles** form while you stir.

Measure 1 tablespoon of glycerin or 1/4 cup of corn syrup and add it to the container. Stir the solution until it is mixed together.



For membership roll call, "If you could go anywhere in the world, where would you go?"


March 17, 2019 minutes were read by Alayna Bruner, secretary, and approved as read. Treasurer's report was given by






Ringen Brushy 4-H Club


Two male members and four female members were present, along with five parents present.



2018 state team members recognized by Missouri Senate

Members of the Missouri Senate 100th General Assembly honored team members from the 2018 Missouri state shooting sports teams that brought home the National Championship this past June.

Calendar sales:

I hope all sales are going well! I have distributed all of the 4500 calendars out to the counties. We have several new counties that are selling calendars this year and they seem to be selling at a great pace.

With the changes this year, we will be able to sell through most county fairs. While this does give an extra month for sales, we would still like to have all calendar sales wrapped up as soon as we can. If you have parts of your order sold and money collected you can send in stubs and checks at any time. This allows the state office to relay information to Travis Scott (Friends of NRA rep) as to how sales are progressing.

Last year we had a good year of sales with just shy of 3500 calendars sold by 4-H, which was up from under 3000 the year before. However, we are still well below past sales that were over 4300 calendars sold.

We are offering our gift card incentive program again this year to the top 3 youth members.

For the top seller a \$100 gift card; second \$75; and third \$50. Last year the top 3 sellers all sold over 50 calendars each.

Sand Cast a Birdbath

from Miss Billie's file cabinet

Materials

Large leaf
1 bag of sand
2 bags of concrete
Water
Plastic wrap
Paint or concrete dye (optional)
Concrete sealer

Tools

Bucket or mixing
Tray for concrete
Hoe for mixing
Scrub brush
Paintbrush
Foam brush
2 containers for paint and sealer

How to make the birdbath Start by making a dome-shaped pile of sand that's big enough for the entire leaf to rest on plus a couple of inches to spare. This rhubarb leaf used all of a 40-lb. bag of sand. Any type will do. The sand pile will support the concrete-covered leaf and create the shallow depression that holds the water. In the photo above, I'm covering the completed sand dome with plastic wrap to keep the sand from sticking to any concrete that might leak through or run over the edge of the leaf. Now lay the leaf face down on top of the sand like the one above. After I laid this leaf down, I needed to adjust the sand pile a bit to make sure the leaf was fully



supported. You may need to do this, too. Many leaves wilt quickly, so wait to harvest yours until you need it or keep it in a bucket of water until you're ready. Cut the stem off close to the base of the leaf. Check the plastic wrap to make sure it extends a couple of inches beyond the leaf edge. If the leaf you want to use has a hole or a tear, no problem. Just cut a piece from a different leaf and use it as a patch. Pour the dry concrete into a mixing tray and add water until it's the consistency of a thick brownie mix. (It took three quarters of a 40-lb. bag for this leaf). Scoop some concrete onto the center of the leaf and begin working it toward the outer edges like I'm doing in the photo above. Make it about 3/4 in. thick in the middle (or whatever it takes to cover the leaf veins) and taper it to 1/4 in. at the edge. Once the leaf is covered with concrete, cover it with plastic wrap. If it's hot outdoors, put a piece of moist burlap over the plastic so the concrete dries evenly. Give it at least 48 hours

to dry. After at least 48 hours, you can remove the top layer of plastic and turn your concrete leaf over. In my experience, if it hasn't dried thoroughly, a chunk along the edge is the most likely part to break off as you pick it up. To be on the safe side, have a friend help you turn it over or work your hand through the sand and lift it from the center. Peel off the second sheet of plastic wrap and start pulling out the leaf. Most of it comes out easily, but as you can see in the photo, you may have to scrub a bit. Even though the concrete is dry, it needs to cure for a week, so wait to paint or add the water. To use your leaf as it is, just add a coat of concrete sealer, such as Thompson's® Water Seal® or Drylock®, for protection. In the photo, I'm painting on several coats of a thin wash of acrylic paint. This wash was about three drops of paint to two cups of water. It dries quickly and you can begin another coat almost as soon as you finish the first. I've also used concrete dye, water color, oil and spray paint. Finish your painted leaf with a coat of sealer.

High Point/Reserve High Point ALL AROUND (one rider & one horse team) and High Point/Reserve High Point RIDER (awarded to exhibitors who MUST show multiple horses) will be given in each division: Walk-Trot, 13&U, and 14&O. (See Rules IV. Page 4)

- Prior to showing, exhibitors must select which award best suits their riding scenario and sign up for eligibility. To qualify for a high point award, exhibitors must NOMINATE themselves when entering. They must choose between High Point ALL AROUND or High Point RIDER (You may NOT receive both High Point ALL AROUND and the High Point RIDER.)
- To qualify for a High Point ALL AROUND/High Point RIDER award, the exhibitor must show in showmanship. Points earned in "All Ages" or "Ponies" classes contribute towards your High Point age Category, unless specified.
- If you choose to show a horse in the "Ponies" Hunter Under Saddle or Western Pleasure, you may ONLY show that horse in "Ponies" classes. You can NOT show the same horse in "Ponies," "Qtr.," or "Saddle type" classes. Select ONE Hunter Under Saddle or Western Pleasure class that best represents the particular horse that is being exhibited. (See Rules III.G.3. Page 2)
- Each exhibitor may only show one horse per class.
- WALK-TROT may NOT enter classes that lope. Walk-Trot is "recommended" for exhibitors in their 1st or 2nd year of the horse project and have not won a ribbon at the Missouri State Fair 4-H/FFA Horse Show.

*Properly fitted ASTM and SEI certified helmets will be required for all events in classes 7-17 and 34-45. A rider will be disqualified if the helmet is not on the exhibitor's head and fastened for the entire time the exhibitor is in the arena.

RE: Growth and Quality Barrow Classic

Dear Missouri State Fair Barrow Exhibitor:

We appreciate your past participation in the Missouri State Fair and look forward to your future involvement. Please note the following guidelines to compete in the Growth and Quality Barrow Classic.

Due to bio-security reasons associated with the spread of PEDv, nominated barrows will not be weighed in April, but weight per day of age calculation based upon documented birth dates will be used. There is no restriction on the birthdate. All pigs will be exhibited at the State Fair based on the documented birthdate. Documented birthdates would include a signed paper from the breeder or registration papers. Barrows must be nominated for participation on or before May 17, 2019. I have enclosed an "Intent to Participate" form for you to fill out and return to me. Each exhibitor may nominate any combination up to ten (10) crossbred or purebred barrows. All barrows must have a documented birth date, ear notches and/or registration tattoos. Once nominated and the form returned, the exhibitor will be mailed to ear notches and/or registration tattoos and birth date. Extra tags are to be returned per the instructions provided. The nomination of barrows is only that, it does not mean that you are required to exhibit them or are they entered for the fair. The decision to do so is left up to the exhibitor when making entries to the fair later in the year.

Each exhibitor may choose a total of ten (10) barrows to enter for the Missouri State Fair. The Growth and Quality Barrow Classic is a **terminal** show. Barrows will be weighed and ultra sounded at the State Fair on Wednesday, August 7th between 9:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. The live show will be held on Thursday, August 8th. All qualifying barrows will be loaded for processing immediately following the live show.

Due to processing facility availability, barrows will be sorted by lean gain per day, ultrasound (BF, LEA), and live placing prior to the pork quality evaluation. Only the top half ranking barrows (not to exceed 50 total including breed representations) will be loaded and evaluated for pork quality. The remaining barrows will be released to the exhibitors.
