Native Knowledge...

Golden Currant

(Ribes odoratum)

This small shrub is also called flowering currant, buffalo currant and clove currant. It grows to a height of 4-6 feet with a spread of 5 to 8 feet. It will grow in full sun to part shade.

The flowers appear in mid-March to mid-April. They are yellow in color and have five petals. Flowers have a strong, clove-like fragrance. Fruit is blue black and occurs in June if the plants are cross-pollinated. If you only have one plant, you will only get flowers.

Leaves are simple, alternate, 3 to 5 lobed with petioles 1/4 to 1 inch long.

Its native habitat is high rocky limestone or dolomite bluffs along the White River drainage. It was never abundant in Missouri in the wild.

Makes a nice garden/ yard plant. Tolerates moderate to dry soils. It provides early nectar for bees and birds and small animals eat the fruit.

The name buffalo currant



comes from the use of the fruit found on the Great Plains prairies. It was used by many of the Native American tribes as well as early settlers.



Volunteer Outlets Profile:

Camp Brim Shire - Volunteer Outlet of the Quarter Workday

The 2019 VOQ Workday at Camp Brim Shire will be on April 6th from 9:00am – 2:00pm. Work will include helping with prepping camp for opening by clearing paths, weeding, cleaning and other tasks as needed. Bring a lunch and your own tools or use some available from the Camp. Camp Brim Shire was created in 1980 by Richard and Sherry Hashagen. The Association for Midwest Disadvantaged Youth (AMDY) oversees Camp Brim Shire and is an entirely all-volunteer effort, designated as a 501(c)3 foundation. Armed with \$100. a handful of volunteers, a 40acre parcel and a vision, the Hashagen's began their journey to bring Camp Brim Shire to life. They strove to create a fully ADA accessible camp to mid-Missouri youth and organizations."

In July 1980, the first visitors arrived: a group of 13 Boy Scouts from Troop 271 of North St. Louis County. These scouts camped with very limited resources, but great enthusiasm for learning. Troop 271 still returns three times a

year. Today Camp Brim Shire serves children to veterans from the nearby Missouri Veterans Home at our fully ADA accessible campus.

Camp Brim Shire serves disabled and disadvantaged youth and adults along with seniors, local military families and many other organizations.

Key to Camp Brim Shire and AMDY's success are the many volunteers who take time to make the Camp Brim Shire experience memorable. Meramec Hills Master Naturalist play an important role at Camp Brim Shire with the various volunteer projects and service hours spent onsite. Other volunteers include civic organizations, local businesses, students from MS&T, scouting groups, military personnel from Fort Leonard Wood and many others.

Camp Brim Shire was designed, built and continues to be operated solely on donations. From 1980 to 1988 Brim Shire was totally free to all children and agencies. Today, the AMDY & Camp Brim Shire continue to operate with no paid employees and 90% of visitors are still able to stay free of cost with the

remainder paying a modest fee of \$2 per day.

Programs offered at Camp Brim Shire are based on conservation, protection and appreciation of wildlife and the outdoors. Brim Shire is a certified wildlife habitat, longterm member of Forest Keepers Network and has been recognized by national, state and local organizations. The camp serves over 4,500 folks in the mid-central Missouri Region each year from Lebanon to St. Louis.

Update: Rich has been caring for Sherry after a series of serious health issues. In 2019, Sherry has spent a month at Barnes in St. Louis, 3 weeks at a rehab home in Cuba and, due to insurance issues, she is now at home although they are struggling to manage her care and finding appropriate home health.

They welcome visitors to help engage Sherry and appreciate all the prayers and support from the Master Naturalists. Rich was a founding member of the Meramec Hills Chapter.
