

Economic and Community Development Highlights

• In FY23, Business Development Specialists worked with small businesses and entrepreneurs statewide to create or retain 98,527 jobs.



For every dollar invested from 2019 to 2021, the MU Extension Business Development Program has returned \$133 in economic impact for its clients by increasing sales more than \$1.6 billion. For a total impact of \$3.1 billion, the program has generated more than 37,000 jobs and attracted nearly \$451 million in capital investments and \$1.5 billion in government contracts.

 Between FY18 and FY23, UM System brought Missouri more than \$1.58 billion in federal and private research funds, funded primarily from outside the state, but spent within the state.



In FY24, UM System was issued 29 patents and filed 69 new U.S. patent applications.

 In FY24, the UM System awarded 707 design and construction project contracts throughout Missouri, for a total investment of \$287.3 million in the state.



In FY24, to improve access to medical and health related services, MU Health Care's Missouri Telehealth Network's Show-Me ECHO program provided 16,687 hrs of case-based instruction to 3,113 learners located in 105 of 114 Missouri counties and the city of St. Louis.

UM System's MOREnet (Missouri Research and Education Network) provides internet connectivity, access, support and training to 58 higher education institutions (230,000 students), 484 K-12 school districts (830,000 students) and 134 public libraries (serving nearly 3 million Missourians) in 2023.

- UM System awarded 50.5% of the 31,689 Bachelor's or higher degrees awarded by Missouri four-year public institutions in 2023-24.
- · UM System awarded 35.0% of the 1,776 research doctorates and 26.8% of the 3,796 professional doctorates awarded by Missouri public and not-for-profit private institutions in 2023-24.
- In FY24, UM System's \$30.7 million in National Science Foundation (NSF) grants represented 96.9% of all NSF grants made to Missouri public colleges and universities.
- In 2024, over 12,400 Missourians accessed mobroadband.org, part of the UM System Broadband Initiative which helped the statewide build-out of high-speed internet infrastructure.


Knowing Local Challenges

CHALLENGE 1: Economic Opportunity: Business Dynamics

Business Growth/Change

The rate of business change reflects the net gain or loss in total establishments. The report area saw a net gain of 1,023 businesses between 2011 and 2021. There were 9,238 establishment "births" and 8,215 "deaths" contributing to the change. The rate of change was 14.17% over the ten year period, which is higher than the state average of 9.32%.


Largest Job Sectors

Understanding the local economy is vital to describing a community. In this region, the largest sector by employment size is Retail trade , which employs 26,862 people. The average wage for the industry is \$35,502. Health care and social assistance and Accommodation and food services are the next largest sectors, and they employ 21,694 and 19,941 workers, respectively.

Access to Early Childhood Education

Head Start is an early childhood education program for at-risk children through age 5. Families utilizing Head Start have better success meeting developmental goals and achieving economic stability. In 2018, there were 4 Head Start programs in the report area, or 1.73 per 10,000 population. Access to head start is lower in this area than in the state.

Head Start Programs, Rate (Per 10,000 Children Under Age 5)



English Language Arts Proficiency

Starting in the 4th grade, public schools emphasize proficiency in reading and reading comprehension. The ability to comprehend becomes the foundation to find and process information in later years and it is important to prevent children from falling behind. Of the 4,156.00 fourth graders tested in 2018, the known total number of students who had a basic level of English Language Arts was 1,394.00. The number tested as below basic was 314.00, basic was 1,394.00, proficient was 1,257.00, and advanced was 1,145.00.






CHALLENGE 3: Healthy Futures: Access to Care

Mental Health Care Providers

Mental health is a critical public health issue worldwide. Access to mental health services is a challenge across Missouri, which ranks 46 out of 51 states in provider access. In the trio there are approximately 918 credentialed professionals providing mental health care to serve the area's 405,262 residents. The patient-provider ratio in the report area is 441 to 1, which means there is 1 provider for every 441 persons. The ratio of persons to providers in the report area is higher than the state average of 346:1, which means there are fewer providers per person in this area.

Primary Care Providers

Older adults make up a historically large percentage of the U.S. population and meeting the healthcare needs of an aging population can be challenging. In the report area, there are approximately 192 primary care physicians (MDs and DOs) to serve the area's 67,683 residents over the age of 65. The patient-provider ratio in the report area is 353:1, which means there is 1 provider for every 353 older adults. The ratio of adults to providers in the report area is higher than the state average of 250:1, which means there are fewer providers per person in this area.

CHALLENGE 4: Agricultural Growth & Stewardship: Food Security & Access

The ability to access healthy and affordable food can be a challenge in Missouri's rural and urban communities alike — with negative impacts on people's health and food security status. Food insecurity is the lack of access, at times, to enough food for an active, healthy life. It is associated with many adverse social and health outcomes. Missouri's overall food insecurity rate is 11.8% — and 12.8% for children under age 18. More than half of Missouri's 114 counties and the City of St. Louis report food insecure populations of 12.6% or higher. Multiple interventions that address the root causes of food insecurity can impact this critical public health issue. Learn more at the Food Security Story Map.

Members participate in clubs, camps, contests, conferences, and more. Youth make new friends, create memories, and cultivate their passions while preparing to be future leaders.

4-H is part of the University of Missouri Extension and is publicly supported by county, state, and federal governments as well as private resources.

Through her passion and dedication, Kaycie has made a lasting impact by creating the St. Charles County Extension Youth Council. 4-H in St. Charles County

In 2024, St. Charles County 4-H had 2286 youth engaged in 4-H activities. Members participated in the following project areas: entrepreneurship, public speaking, community service, photography, shooting sports, arts and crafts, horsemanship, livestock management, embryology, camps, SNAC, and more! These programs were made possible by our 147 adult volunteers.



In the 4-H embryology project, 4-H specialists trained teachers to conduct lessons on human and chicken development. Using incubators, children took care of eggs that hatched into chicks. Brittney Bird, Youth Program Associate, enhanced the 4-H Embryology Program, helping it reach **30** new classrooms and **1874 youth** In May 2024, Bird taught a SNAC (Student Nutrition Advisory Council) class at Francis Howell North High School. Missouri 4-H's SNAC Initiative creates 4-H clubs that teach nutrition, leadership and citizenship skills, reach new youth and families.

Local Impact

MU Extension's Community Development Programs help Missourians tap into collective strengths to build and maintain thriving communities. Extension Engagement Specialist Deana Dothage is available to speak in-depth about Extension at local programs and events.

Engaged Neighbor Program

The Engaged Neighbor Program arms people with the tools to improve relationships with their neighbors and foster a better sense of community. In 2024, EES Dothage delivered seven engaged neighbor presentations at organization meetings and conferences.

Missouri Extension Leadership Development (MELD)

The Missouri Extension Leadership Development program (MELD) is an intensive leadership development program designed to develop the future leaders of MU Extension and Engagement. Participants attended four sessions throughout 2024 to grow their leadership capacity and build a robust state-wide network of Extension colleagues. They engaged in self-awareness assessments, workshops, experiential & project-based learning activities, guest lectures, and networking events to strengthen and refine their leadership skills.

EES Deana Dothage completed MELD 2024 in November.

Neighborhood Art Week

EES Dothage was on the MU Extension team that coordinated the first Show Me Neighborhood Art Week. This program encourages Missourians to beautify their neighborhoods with homemade artwork. 73 participants from all corners of Missouri created murals, yard displays, painted stones, and tree decorations, then registered their addresses to be displayed on the MU Extension website.

Connecting Entrepreneurial Communities (CEC)

The Connecting Entrepreneurial Communities conference helps Missouri communities boost economic growth. CEC 2024 was held in Fulton, MO. Attendees shared best practices, learned from successes and failures, and exchanged ideas. EES Deana Dothage is a member of the CEC state planning team. CEC 2025 will be in Excelsior Springs, MO

Local Impact

Neighborhood Leadership Academy (NLA)

NLA is a hands-on leadership training program that teaches residents community building principles, management practices, and personal and organizational leadership skills. In 2024, EES Dothage led a cohort of eight from the Urban East region, and co-facilitated three of ten sessions.

Small Business Development Center

The Missouri Small Business Development Center (SBDC) offers an extensive range of personalized services that small businesses can consult to aid their success. For over 20 years, the SBDC has partnered with the Economic Development Center in St. Charles County to host an on-site Business Counselor, providing invaluable support to local entrepreneurs at every stage of their business' journey.

The SBDC is a collaborative initiative between the U.S. Small Business Administration and MU Extension, dedicated to empowering businesses statewide.



Strategic Doing

Strategic Doing is a community focused method of helping areas capitalize on their resources, use them in a way that may be unfamiliar to them and leave the session with a plan for making changes to the status quo. EES Dothage completed formal Strategic Doing training in 2024. As part of her training, Dothage assisted with multiple statewide Strategic Doing workshops.

Labor Education Program

This program works with organization members and leaders to develop skills that will make them effective contributors to their workplace and active participants in their community.



Missouri APEX Accelerator

The Missouri APEX Accelerator's procurement specialists help businesses (including small, disadvantaged, veteran, and women-owned firms) obtain federal, state, and local government contracts.

Health and Human Sciences

Local Impact

SNAP-Ed

Offered through the USDA, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program Education (SNAP-Education or SNAP-Ed) brought \$11,145,237 in federal funds to Missouri. The funds support engagement with 74,864 SNAP recipients and eligible Missourians who learned about staying active and eating healthy on a budget. This year, SNAP had 1,164,143 indirect educational contacts through newsletters, health fairs, food pantries, and the Show Me Nutrition helpline. 6,059 direct and indirect contacts were made in St. Charles County.

Participants in SNAP-Ed:

-Learn the importance of making healthier meal and snack choices

-Eat breakfast more often

-Are more willing to try new foods, increase their physical activity, and make healthier food choices

Those who practice healthy eating and are physically active are more likely to contribute to a healthy labor force and enjoy a higher quality of life.

This vital programming effort also reduces healthcare costs over the participant's lifetime, saving taxpayer money in reduced public healthcare benefits and insurance premiums.

Nutrition and Health Programs

The Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program (EFNEP) brought \$1,624,777 federal funds to Missouri. These funds were used to enroll 559 limited-resource families in nutrition education and meal preparation classes, representing 2,068 family members. Additionally, 2,864 youth were enrolled in EFNEP classes.

15 of these youth and adult participants reside in St. Charles County.

Participants in EFNEP learn the importance of making healthier meals and snack choices, eating breakfast more often, trying new foods, increasing their physical activity, and making healthier food choices. Those who practice healthy eating and are physically active are more likely to contribute to a healthy labor force and enjoy a high quality of life throughout the lifespan.

This vital programming effort also reduces healthcare costs over the participant's lifetime, saving taxpayer money in reduced public healthcare benefits and insurance premiums.

MU Extension in St. Charles County offered two home food preservation classes in 2024. 22 people attended. Topics included water bath canning, making sweet spreads, canning tomatoes, and pressure canning low acid foods.

Using research-based methods for home food preservation is critically important. Outdated or unsafe methods can result in serious illness. After attending the classes in St. Charles County, participants noted they plan on taking the following actions after the program:

- Preserve food as a result of the session they attended
- Use tested recipes from reliable sources
- Share food preservation information with other people
- Plan to buy or update their equipment

Program Highlights

-Nutrition and Health Field Specialist Cassidy Palmer provided a Dining With Diabetes program through Horizon Housing Foundation that reached 15 individuals.

"I learned how carefully I need to read food labels. They are tricky!" –Anonymous Participant

-Palmer enrolled over 200 seniors in the Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program, helping low-income seniors access locally-grown produce

-Two in-person **Stay Strong**, **Stay Healthy** strength training programs for older adults (and five collaborative in-person and virtual programs) made a total of **738** contacts.

-Stay Strong, Stay Healthy programs at the St. Charles Senior Center reached **62** older adults

-15 4-H campers were taught about nutrition and each participant made their own yogurt parfait

-Palmer was invited by MU Extension Community Development Coordinator Bill McKelvey to join the Food Systems Network Planning Committee. This group works to build strong and resilient community-based food systems statewide to increase food security for all Missourians.

Janelle Azmy, Community Health Specialist for the Urban East region, spearheaded the creation of the Urban East Regional Needs Assessment, a detailed 110-page report blending quantitative data with community survey insights to uncover public health challenges.

This Extension-led initiative showcased St. Charles County's strong health indicators, including the highest life expectancy in the region and comparatively lower rates of cancer and heart disease, while also addressing pressing concerns such as mental health, chronic disease, and environmental hazards.

Building on this foundation, Extension has broadened its impact by actively supporting the St. Charles County Public Health Department in its ongoing Community Health Assessment, with Janelle serving as a member of the steering committee for this 2-year process.

Key actions Azmy has taken:

- Working with organizations like the American Heart Association and Empower Missouri to develop a statewide Extension initiative addressing heart disease.
- Partnering with Ellis Fischel Cancer Center to distribute free radon test kits to local libraries across the region.
- Assisted in the St. Charles Sequential Intercept Mapping process to identify community needs and form work groups to address them. Continued work on the Resources work group.
- Conducted seven WeCanPROSPER Resiliency trainings in partnership with organizations like Sana Lake Recovery Center.
- Serving on the St. Charles Health Department Steering Committee for the Community Health Assessment.

MU Extension's **horticulture** programs provide informational support and hands-on resources to budding and experienced gardeners alike

Heroes to Hives



The Heroes to Hives program improves veterans' financial and personal wellness by teaching them the science of beekeeping.

In 2024, horticulture specialist Eli Isele and his team opened an apiary in the St. Louis metro area in collaboration with UMSL. This was the first urban Heroes to Hives site, drawing visitors from all around Missouri's Urban East region.

During the 2024 MU Extension Dean's Tour, Isele and his colleagues discussed the new apiary and how beekeeping can be therapeutic for veterans. Some tour attendees were veterans and took interest in learning more about the program.

Apple Grafting

30 people participated in an apple grafting workshop facilitated by Eli Isele. It included a hands-on demonstration with rootstocks, scions, supplies, and tools for attendees to graft two apple trees.

Master Gardener Training

The 2024 St. Charles County Master Gardener Core Training Program graduated 36 participants. The class is facilitated by various speakers selected by Eli Isele and the St. Charles County Master Gardeners. The 2025 Core Training began on January 16 with 44 registrants.

Soil Testing

A soil test through the University of Missouri's Soil and Plant Testing Laboratory reveals specific needs in clients' soil(s). In 2024, the St. Charles County Extension Office processed 340 samples.

Pesticide Applicator Training

20 participants attended the St. Charles County Private Pesticide Applicator training facilitated by Rusty Lee, MU Extension Agronomy Specialist. Farmers are trained in up-to-date, safe, and environmentally friendly pesticide use methods.

Hydroponics

Hydroponics is a soil-less method of growing plants. Horticulturists Eli Isele, Justin Keay, and a series of experts led a day long class teaching hydroponics to 29 attendees.



Value-Added Production

The Missouri Agriculture, Food and Forestry Innovation Center (MAFFIC) held an educational networking conference at MU Extension in St. Charles County: *Success in Value-Added Production*. The program was tailored for people operating farm or food businesses and had 32 registrants.

Educational Video Award

Eli Isele, St. Charles County Horticulture Specialist, was recognized for an educational video he produced with his colleagues. "Liz Graznak, Happy Hollow Family Farms" is a video aimed at anyone interested in becoming a Missouri Beginning Farmer or Rancher.

After being posted on February 5, 2024, the video garnered 4,000 views in 29 days on MU Extension and Integrated Pest Management social media pages. The National Association of County Agricultural Agents (NACAA) honored Isele and his colleagues as regional winners in the *Educational Video Recordings* category at their 2024 Annual Meeting.

Master Gardeners

Master Gardeners are trained by the University of Missouri to spread research-based gardening knowledge. Through demonstration projects, workshops, and our office's HortLine, these volunteers are dedicated to "helping others learn to grow.

After training, Master Gardeners serve as a resource with MU Extension to give county residents research-based answers to their gardening questions. The primary purpose of a Master Gardener is to volunteer. Members also rate camaraderie and learning opportunities as important reasons for participating.

HortLine



Our HortLine is the Master Gardeners' help desk. Volunteers research the public's gardening questions and provide reliable answers via phone or email. Visitors are welcome from March until October. During winter months, the desk is staffed remotely. In 2024, HortLine volunteers assisted a total of 407 callers!

Demonstration Gardens

The Demonstration Gardens at MU Extension in St. Charles County are where the Master Gardeners learn, work, and teach. The gardens are used to educate and instruct the public on planting, growing, harvesting, and storing, plus pest and disease treatment and prevention. They are open to the public from dawn until dusk.

2024 Milestones



- The Master Gardeners donated a total of 3,030 lbs of produce to the Sts. Joachim and Ann Care Service Food Pantry. 1695 lbs were harvested from the Pantry Garden.
- 770 plants and 150 bulbs were donated to St. Charles County Parks.
- Retired FOX 2 Investigative Reporter Elliott Davis live streamed a garden tour in September to promote MU Extension in St. Charles County. Master Gardeners Kevin Minard and Cindy Platzer conducted the tour.

At their 2024 spring plant sale, the master gardeners sold 7,182 plants.



"In The Garden" Seminars

"In The Garden" was the Master Gardeners' 2024 winter education program. The three sessions had 88 registrants in total. 2025 classes began January 11.

Participants learned basic gardening techniques to prepare for spring, including garden design, tool selection and care, soil amendment, and building raised beds.



Bee Bar, Moon Garden, Chocolate Garden

The Master Gardeners unveiled themed gardens that began development in 2023. The Bee Bar has plants that attract bees, the chocolate bar has plants that look and smell like chocolate, and the moon garden has plants that thrive at night.



76 people attended free tours of our gardens, learning about our area's diverse plant and wildlife.

Missouri Master Naturalists

The Missouri Master Naturalist program promotes the stewardship of Missouri's natural resources by training volunteers in environmental preservation.

The Confluence Chapter is St. Charles County's local Master Naturalist group. In 2024 they completed a total of 4679 volunteer hours, including 1300 in St. Charles County Parks.



The Master Naturalists' 2024 conservation projects in St. Charles county included:

- Monarch Madness Pollinator Festival at the Weldon Spring Site Interpretive Center (the 2025 event has begun its planning stage)
- Quail Ridge County Park Native Garden
- Stream Team monitoring
- Bluebird monitoring and fledging; 268 bluebirds fledged from 60 boxes at 4 parks
- Collaboration with Master Gardeners at St. Charles Main Street Native Garden
- O'Fallon Public Works Native Garden
- Hosting dozens of children from local elementary schools at the Native Explore Classroom in Towne Park

Bluebird Conservation

the Confluence Chapter's Broemmelsiek Bluebird Trail Team presented on bluebird conservation at the Missouri Bluebird Society (MoBS) Conference. They were presented with the MoBS Bluebird Conservation Award, accepted by Master Naturalist Leslie Limberg (pictured below right).



Youth Naturalists

A youth naturalist program was initiated through a grant from UMSL and the Neighborhood Leadership Academy. Four program scholarships were awarded to middle and high school students who participated in bluebird monitoring, Monarch Madness, and the Low Ropes Obstacle Course

First Impact






