The show opened in the Historic Stoddard County Courthouse in downtown Bloomfield with almost 200 Youth Art Entries from grades K-12. Winning the top Award for "Best of Show" went to Kayla Nash with her artwork of a turtle titled: "Hidden". Kayla attends Puxico High School and her Art Teacher is Jav Pierce. Students were given ribbons and prizes in each grade level for 1st-3rd place and two Honorable Mentions. Richland R1 School Art Teacher Zenita Smith said that her younger students did not have opportunities to enter Art Shows like older students. The "Youth Farm Animal Art Show" was a much needed venue to showcase her young students works of art. The focus of the Stoddard County University of Missouri Extension, is to bring research based educational programs to Stoddard County, said Kristi Baker, County Engagement Specialist in 4-H Youth Development. Research shows Art programs have the potential to help improve a student's memory and concentration skills, develop decision-making and critical thinking skills, enhance communication and listening skills, but also encourage focus and discipline. ... An arts education can also help a student to improve self-esteem and social skills. Drawing plays a big role in our cognitive development. Liberty Tree Applications

We are excited to announce that the Missouri 4-H Foundation, in partnership with Crader Distributing and local STIHL dealers, will be continuing the service-learning initiative that enables 4-H clubs to play an active role in preserving American history by planting Liberty Trees once more this spring in communities throughout Missouri.

The original Liberty Tree was a famous elm tree that stood near Boston Common during the Revolutionary era. In 1765, the Sons of Liberty, a group of American colonists, staged the first act of defiance against British rule under the tree. This spawned the resistance that eventually led to the American Revolutionary War. During the war, several other towns designated their own Liberty Trees as support for the resistance spread throughout the colonies. These Liberty Trees became symbols of American independence.

The last original Liberty Tree, a Tulip Poplar, stood on the grounds of St. John's College in Annapolis, Md. Until 1999 when it dies during Hurricane Floyd. Prior to its death, 14 seedlings were successfully germinated from the tree through a project spearheaded by the nonprofit conservation organization American Forests. The seedlings were planted throughout the original 13 colonies.

In order to further preserve the legacy of the Liberty Trees, a bud-grafting program was launched, through which several bud-grafted trees were grown. Thanks to the generosity of Crader Distributing and local STIHL dealers, these bud-grafted trees will be donated to Missouri 4-H clubs to be planted in public spaces throughout Missouri. The trees are 4 foot Tulip Poplar seedlings.

There are a limited quantity of trees available for the spring. Applications will be reviewed on a first come first served basis.

Attached you will find the Liberty Tree Application. The application is due by April 5, 2019 and can be submitted to Missouri 4-H Foundation at 4hfoundation@missouri.edu

Please note that all tree plantings must be done the week of April 22-28. In order to ensure that the trees are equally available across the state, only one tree per county will be available. Applications will be reviewed and we will announce recipients of the trees the week after the deadline. Please note if you have talked with our office regarding a replacement for a damaged tree please go ahead and complete the application and note that this is a replacement

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Creamy Strawberry French Toast Bake

3 cups sliced fresh strawberries, divided

2 tablespoons sugar

1 package (8 ounces) cream cheese, softened 1/2 cup confectioners' sugar

1 tablespoon grated orange zest

1 tablespoon orange juice

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

1 loaf (1 pound) cinnamon bread, cut into 1-in. pieces

5 large eggs

1 cup half-and-half cream

Sweetened whipped cream

Directions

Toss 2 cups strawberries with sugar. In another bowl, beat the next 5 ingredients until smooth. Place half the bread in a greased 13x9-in. baking dish. Spoon cream cheese mixture over bread. Layer with strawberry mixture and remaining bread. Whisk eggs and cream until blended; pour over top. Refrigerate, covered, overnight.

Preheat oven to 350°. Remove casserole from refrigerator while oven heats. Bake, uncovered, until a knife inserted in the center comes out clean, 40-45 minutes. Let stand 5 minutes before serving. Top with whipped cream and remaining strawberries.

Directions

1.Cut out an egg shape from your cardboard. I drew the shape for my preschooler and she cut it out herself.

2.Tear off a piece of tin foil from your roll. Lay your egg on top of it and then fold the tin foil edges over the egg all over so the front of the egg is completely covered in the foil.

3. Leaving the lid on the Sharpie marker, have your preschooler use it to draw lines and designs all over the tin foil easter egg.

4. When they are finished drawing designs, they can use all of the Sharpie markers to trace over their designs and add any more details that they'd like.
