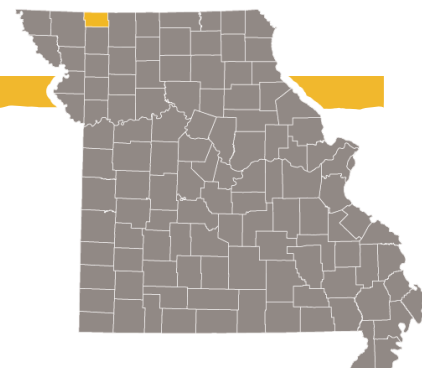

Key outcomes and numbers

- ✓ 30 direct contacts with Worth County residents at 8 educational events in the County.
- ✓ 1,358 indirect contacts at Worth County Council meetings, livestock shows, 4-H events, and other community connections, with another 164 contacts with Worth County residents at events in neighboring counties.
- ✓ A total of 627 educational contacts from MU Extension to residents of the County, including:
 - 35 related to productive farming, better gardening, and managing natural resources
 - 480 related to healthy eating and aging, strengthening families, personal finance, or youth development
 - 112 related to starting businesses, developing community leaders, or renewing the local economy

MU Extension is a unique funding partnership.

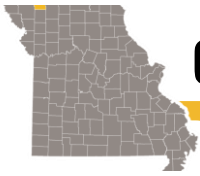

Family Nutrition Education Program

Missouri Extension's Family Nutrition Program (FNEP) reached 145 direct and indirect participants with nutrition education in Worth County during 2021, a significant percentage of which were low income. FNEP provides information on nutrition, food safety, and physical activity for lifelong health and fitness by working with qualifying schools, community groups and agencies.

In 2021, Jackie Spainhower served on the planning committee for the inaugural Creating Entrepreneurial Communities (CEC) Conference held September 29-30 in Hannibal. The CEC conference aims to create, connect, and promote community economic revitalization through entrepreneurship and will be hosted by a new entrepreneurial community each year.

Worth County 4-H

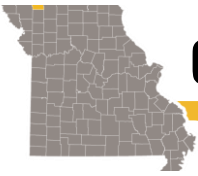
Worth County had a total of 37 members and 3 Clubs for the 2020-2021 4-H year. These clubs include: Sheridan Shamrocks, Westfork Boosters, and Allendale Arrows. Our clubs are led by Amber Hawk, Glenda Craven, and Lori Wimer. We also added a Horsemanship SPIN (Special Interest) Club this year in which many of our Worth County youth participated. Our families were very excited to give their youth a chance to learn



about and ride horses even if they don't own their own horse. We are looking forward to all the opportunities this club has to offer our youth in the future.



During the year of 2021 our regional events were starting to get back to normal. Because of the Covid-19 virus, the way we programmed 4-H events completely changed. Many of our events moved to an online setting in 2020. But this year we were able to have in person events with some limits. Our 4-H camp was able to take place but only as a day camp. Our Energizer event also took place but with a limited number being able to attend in person and most participants attending online. In 2022 we are hoping to take another step in getting back to more of a normal programming year with overnight stay at camp and an in person only energizer. We have all learned the great things we can do online with our technology if need be. But we're all ready to return to seeing each other face to face.
