


MEET MIZZOU.



HOW TO GET HERE.

Follow these steps to apply for admission to Mizzou.

- Submit an application online and the \$55 application fee. The final application deadline is June 1.
- Request your high school send official transcripts to the Office of Admissions at 230 Jesse Hall Columbia, MO 65211.
- Have official test scores sent to Mizzou directly from ACT (code: 2382) or the College Board if you took the SAT (code: 6875).



ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

You meet the requirements for admission to Mizzou if you have completed the required high school curriculum with good grades and you:

Have earned a composite ACT score of 24 or higher.

-OR-

Have earned an SAT score of 1160 or higher

-OR-

Meet the scale below based on if you are from a ranking or non-ranking school.

Applicants lacking any of the core requirements or who do not meet the criteria listed in the tables below receive a comprehensive review of their application. Files might be subject to additional review if the applicant's core GPA is low. In some cases, these students are admitted on probation.

REQUIRED HIGH SCHOOL CURRICULUM

Students are expected to follow a college preparatory curriculum that includes at least 17 units of credit (one unit = one year in class).





Imagine chanting "M-I-Z" alongside classmates and fellow Tigers at Memorial Stadium, nicknamed "The Zou," which seats 71,000-plus.

Nineteen Mizzou teams compete in the Southeastern Conference (SEC) and Tiger football has capped 10 of the past 14 seasons with a bowl game. The softball team made it to the NCAA Tournament eight of the past nine seasons. And star wrestler J'Den Cox even brought home a bronze medal for the 2016 U.S. Olympic team.

Fun fact: our Tigers do just as well off the field, too. Mizzou is an SEC leader in academic progress rate, which measures eligibility, retention and graduation rates.

You can also stay active living on campus just steps from our award-winning Student Recreation Complex, a 300,000 sq. ft. fitness and leisure facility featuring a 42-foot climbing wall, full-service spa, four fabulous pools and more than 14,000 pounds of free weights.

INVEST IN YOURSELF.

College is a big investment with even bigger returns. Which is why staying on top of the financial aid process really pays off. Follow these steps to make sure you get the most out of your tuition dollars.

- Simply apply for admission to be considered for the automatic scholarships listed on the next page. You're encouraged to apply to Mizzou before Dec. 1 of your senior year for maximum scholarship consideration.
- To be considered for general and departmental scholarships, you must fill out the MU Annual Scholarship Application by Dec. 15. Watch your email for instructions and info about available scholarships.
- For loans and grants, you must submit your Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) by Feb. 1 for priority consideration. Some scholarships require you submit your FAFSA before the general priority date.

- Award amounts vary from \$1,000 up to the cost of attendance for Missouri residents
- Nonresidents receive approximately \$15,500/year as a scholarship for nonresident portion of tuition

MIZZOU HERITAGE SCHOLARSHIP \$15,500/YEAR (Nonresident; approximate)

- Student whose biological, adoptive or stepparent graduated from Mizzou
- Top 25 percent of high school graduating class**
- ACT score of 27 or higher, or a 1280 SAT or higher
- Eligible students receive a scholarship equivalent to the nonresident portion of tuition, which may be canceled or reduced if nonresident tuition is waived or paid by another source.

MARK TWAIN NONRESIDENT SCHOLARSHIP

DIVERSITY AWARD

Students belonging to underrepresented groups on campus may qualify in order to advance the University's goal of maintaining a rich, culturally diverse student body. Recipients are automatically prescreened and selected based on high school class rank,** ACT or SAT scores and grades in college prep courses. Nonresident students receive a scholarship equivalent to the nonresident portion of tuition.

*NOTE: These costs do not include estimates for books, supplies and any personal expenses. The cost of attendance presented is a standardized estimate of various university charges and other educational expenses. Amounts are subject to change at any time; however, any tuition or fee increases must be approved by the University of Missouri Board of Curators 30 days prior to the beginning of the academic term. Any approved revision of tuition/fees are effective regardless of whether they have been paid prior to the revision.

COMPETITIVE SCHOLARSHIPS

GEORGE C. BROOKS SCHOLARSHIP \$7,500/YEAR (Missouri resident)

\$7,500 + \$15,500/YEAR (Nonresident; approximate)

Thirty-five recipients will be chosen. An essay is required for consideration and eligible students will be invited to apply after admission. The deadline to apply is Dec. 15. Minimum qualifications include an excellent academic record, plus high ACT or SAT scores: and membership in a racial or ethnic minority group that is underrepresented in relation to the university's goal to achieve educational benefits of a diverse student body. Eligible students receive a scholarship equivalent to the nonresident portion of tuition.

MIZZOU SCHOLARS AWARD \$10,000/YEAR

Approximately 30 students will receive the award. Must be a Missouri resident. An application for admission, a résumé and essay must be submitted by Dec. 15. A committee will review candidates and make final selections based upon credentials and supplemental material, with the

strongest consideration given to the strength of the academic record.

- Minimum ACT score of 33 or a 1490 SAT
- Excellent academic record

STAMPS SCHOLARS AWARD FULL **SCHOLARSHIP**

(up to the estimated cost of attendance)

Five students will receive the award. To be invited to apply, you must be admitted to Mizzou and the Honors College by Nov. 1. A résumé, essay and recommendation letters are due by Dec. 1. A committee of faculty and administrators will review all applications to select finalists for the award. Finalists will be required to interview and attend a two-day oncampus event.

- Minimum ACT score of 32 or a 1450 SAT
- Minimum core GPA of 3.5 required

DISCLAIMER *Class rank for students who attend non-ranking high schools will be represented by a core grade point average (GPA). This GPA is calculated by Mizzou based on grades in required core collegeprep courses and is different and typically lower than the transcript GPA, All of these scholarships require recipients to have lawful status as a U.S. Citizen or Permanent Resident and to enroll at Mizzou the first semester after high school graduation. Some are mutually exclusive. All scholarships are subject to change without notice. They are not to be regarded as offers to contract.


That's why we suggest all students visit campus to experience our stunning architecture, classic college hangout spots, modern living and learning spaces and to meet our friendly faculty, staff and students.
