Learning Objectives

- Practice the life skills of decision making, communication, leading self and others, planning, organizing, and learning to learn.
- Understand the functions, operations and advantages of digital and film cameras.
- Enhance skills in photography, creative photo techniques and self-expression.
- Build competence and understanding of the role technology can play with modern photography.
- Experience taking and sharing meaningful, high quality photographs.

Fair Projects (County or State)

- Matted photographs you have taken
- A picture frame you have made or decorated
- Camera parts identification poster
- · Informational chart on various light settings
- · Photo story notebook
- Educational display on the history of cameras
- Educational poster about the advantages of digital cameras vs. traditional film cameras

Demonstration Ideas

- How to use a digital camera
- How to select and load film into a camera
- How to download photos onto a computer
- How to develop film
- Using computer programs to enhance photos
- Using the knowledge of grandparents to find interesting subjects to photograph
- Ways photographs can be used electronically (presentations, web pages, etc.)
- How cameras have changed over time

Field Trips

- · Visit a camera store
- Visit a dark room where pictures are developed
- Visit a photography studio

Critical Thinking

- Name the parts of a camera and explain their importance.
- When sharing digital photos with a friend via the Internet, what file format (.bmp, .gif, .jpg, etc.) should you use to make the file size smaller?
- What are some ways your grandparents can help you with a photography project?
- · What does DOCS stand for?
- What are two different light settings? Can you describe them and how they can be used in taking a high quality photograph?
- What are some advantages and disadvantages of using a digital or film camera?
- Why is "a picture worth a thousand words?"

Community Service

- Offer to take photos for family, friends, or at a community event
- Take prom pictures for your school
- Volunteer at a photography studio
- Volunteer to take pictures for parents and their newborns, nursing home residents, etc.
- Share your pictures with the webmasters for your school or 4-H club's web page.

Science & Technology

How have you used science and technology in this project area?

Examples:

- Explore the photo developing process
- Experiment with natural light and angles
- Collaborate with others about digital media and software
- · Describe how film speeds affects photos.

Show Me Character

Trustworthiness - includes honesty, promise keeping and loyalty.

- Claim credit only for photos you have taken
- If you borrow equipment, take good care of it and return it as soon as possible
- Be someone who can be counted upon to do their best every time!
- Keep your promises

Respect - includes courtesy and proper treatment of people and things.

- Arrive to all meetings on-time or early, and call if you think you're going to be late
- Talk to others as you would like to be talked to
- Set an example for future photographers that would make you and your parents proud
- Be patient Pictures won't always come out the way you want, but treat yourself, your equipment and your subjects well.

Responsibility - includes the pursuit of excellence, accountability and perseverance.

- Take the time to do it right
- Keep equipment clean and safe
- Do not allow yourself or your subjects to be in unsafe situations

Fairness - involves consistently applying rules and standards appropriately for different age groups and ability levels.

- Take credit for your work. and give credit to others for their work
- · Treat your subjects as you like to be treated
- Understand that everyone sees the world differently, and that it's okay to be different

Caring - promoting the well being of people and things in a young person's world. It denotes action and not just feelings.

- Be supportive of the efforts and work of others
- · Keep any criticism positive and constructive
- Let others who wish to practice at the same position, lighting and other settings as you have
- Help others learn; it doesn't always have to be a competition!

Citizenship - includes making the home community and county a better place to live for themselves and others.

- Play within the rules: don't trespass or violate other laws to get your photograph
- Share patriotic photos at a local event
- Learn about the role of photo-journalism in world news, and the affect pictures can have on public opinion
