

Herp Check List


According to the Missouri Department of Conservation there are 118 species of "herps" in Missouri. "Herps" is a nickname for the species of animals which are the subject of Herpetology - which is the study of amphibians and reptiles. Most people know them as lizards, snakes, salamanders, turtles, frogs and toads. Here is how MDC breaks down the number of amphibians and reptiles in Missouri:

Amphibians – 43 species

- Frogs & Toads (26)
- Salamanders (17) •

Reptiles - 75 species

- Snakes (47)
- Turtles (17)
- Lizards (11)
